# Rev's Revelations



# "Everyone in this room is negative!"

That was the opening announcement of the Fall Theological Conference which began on September 20. The conference theme was,

"Finding a Way." Despite the pandemic still in full swing, we found a way to gather. Because we needed to. Every person in attendance was fully vaccinated. For two weeks leading up to the event, we recorded our temperatures along with any symptoms that could be Covid19 and we were extra-cautious with wearing masks, distancing, and avoiding crowded gatherings. When we arrived at the conference, we were screened and had rapid Covid19 tests.

There was never so much excitement about negativity— because it meant that we could all stay! It had been two years since the pastors, deacons, and leaders in our synod had gathered. Since that time, we had buried many church members, family members and friends. We had seen two full church seasons— Advent, Christmas, Epiphany, Easter, Pentecost. We had struggled through providing as many opportunities as possible for our people to gather— online and in person. And, yet, our congregations had seen participation, membership, and offerings drop. We all had the same concerns over emotional health of our members, our staffs, and ourselves.

This loss and grief was named in our first session. One of our pastors said, "I became a senior pastor during this time, and I just want to be able to vision with my congregation." I understand that thought! Remember back in 2020, just after I joined Bethlehem and our leadership started Strategic Planning? We just wanted to vision, to plan, to revitalize our mission and members. There were many knowing nods in the room. Then, one of our

chaplains said, "As someone in the pews, I can't imagine being a pastor right now, but I know that I can't plan. I can't promise to be at a meeting next week, let alone imagine next year." Again, there were knowing nods. I know that many of you feel similarly. Too much has changed and is changing to even establish a baseline. This chaplain named what, I think, has been an elephant in the room (or the Zoom) for all of us: We have to step back.

By we, I mean all of us. Pastors, deacons, synod staff, congregation leaders, church members. We need to step back. We need to close our eyes, take a breath, and be for a moment. We need to find our center, our baseline, our starting place. That's hard to do. Our culture pressures us to do more. To set our eyes on the next goal, to run the race, to achieve and succeed. Right now, success might be simply being. Being home, being in worship, being at the meeting, not being at the meeting, or even being negative! Being negative that day meant that I could step back.

When I stepped back— away from the meetings and the planning and all things that fill my calendar— that week of the conference, I remembered something about the Strategic Planning process we began a year and a half ago. That is: we didn't begin with a mission or vision, we began with beliefs and values. We began with the basics. We established a baseline.

This month— as we celebrate our 120th anniversary as a congregation, as we celebrate Confirmation Sunday and Reformation Day— I invite you to step back. You don't have to think months and years ahead. Just let yourself be. Be in the center, at our baseline, at our starting place. Take in where we are— where you are. Breath and be. The future will come soon enough.

Jesus' rebuke of the disciples who are fending off the children should challenge us as well. What does it mean to receive the kingdom of God as a child does? Edited from Sundays and Seasons

The rich man who comes to ask Jesus what he should do to inherit eternal life is a good man, sincere in his asking. Mark's gospel is alone in saying that Jesus looked on him and loved him. #### October 17

Today's gospel starts with disciples obsessing over who will be closest to Jesus, leading to Jesus teaching his followers about God's take on importance and power. When we pray "your kingdom come" we are praying for an end to tyranny and oppression. We pray this gathered around the cross, a sign of great

Can we pray the way Bartimaeus prays?

quietly, but repeats his call for help more


# October 31—Reformation Day; Confirmation Sunday

# **Council Meeting**

This change is due to our upcoming change to a new website which will not have a member's only section.



The Council met on September 14, 2021, with Matt James, Mark Abromski, Jenny Kelley, Greg Schumann, Pr. Katie Chullino, Bob Lee, Brian Carlson, Mark Holste, Eric Kittelberger, and Jim Woodruff in attendance. Matt called the meeting to order at 7:05 p.m. Following the devotions and prayer:

#### **REPORTS**

- Greg reported that this is the fourth month that giving is below budget; the total down is approximately \$50,000. We have enough to function now but must do something soon or we will need to tap into reserves by the end of the year. Greg mailed out a letter to the congregation recently so everyone would be aware of the shortfall. The budgeted mortgage payment is split over 12 months but we are paying out in 10 months so we are on track to pay off next month. Matt moved to approve the treasurer's report; Brian seconded, and the vote was unanimous to approve.
- Pr. Katie had many things going on this week. It is great having Gary here!
   Cornerstone Preschool began last week with minimal issues. The nominating committee needs to meet soon. The funeral lunches/ refreshments committee needs new leaders, or we may need to move to a catering option.
- Evangelism: Bob reported a good turn-out for "2nd Friday" and some dining groups have been scheduled. The Times-Call ad has been updated to indicate both indoor and



outdoor services. A suggestion for the AV team is to put up credits to indicate the end of the service.

• Faith Formation: Brian reported that Gary's first month went well and he is starting to roll; confirmation classes are planned and structure is good. Wasp stings during outside Sunday School are an ongoing problem. Brian and

Gary are also actively recruiting Faith Formation committee members.

- Mission: The Pine Ridge trip is cancelled due to tribal wishes that others not come into the reservation at this time due to increase in Covid19 cases; we made monetary donations to TipiRaisers. Habitat for Humanity build day went well; the next build is in October. Naomi Circle provided lunch for the build day and will be providing the OUR Center lunch on September 26.
- Stewardship: Eric requested feedback on his Celebrate 120 talk—was it effective and how could it be improved? Eric received an offer from a member to match two \$1200 donations (or possibly \$600–1200). There was a question regarding the YouTube channel requirements; we are now listed as a non-profit channel.
- Worship: Jim reported there has been a flurry of activities, and we now have a worship ministry committee (Cindy Tayler, Ray Leake, plus Jim Woodruff and Pr. Katie). The committee has planned for upcoming worship services and started tentative planning for special services in coming months.

#### **UNFINISHED BUSINESS**

Pandemic Advisory group recommendations:
 Matt reported no new meetings since the last
 council meeting. The BoCo requirement for
 masking indoors was already in place at
 BLC; the only change necessary is the
 required 12 foot space if unmasked inside
 (affects presenters and singers).

   Worship endowment account in support of their annual fundraiser.
- RTLC Grace Race Request for Donation: A request was received to sponsor the race at \$200 towards buying participant T-shirts, and council passed this on to interested members for their consideration.

Exec session: Matt moved that council enter into executive session, and Mark H seconded. We entered at 8:35 p.m. Matt moved that council exit the executive session, and Greg seconded. We exited at 10:15 p.m.

Following prayer considerations and the Lord's prayer, the meeting adjourned at 10:21 p.m. The next Council meeting will be Tuesday, October 12, 2021 @ 7:00 p.m.

# Celebrate 120 update

I wanted to reach out and give everybody a quick update on the Celebrate 120 fundraising drive. Before I get too far into it, I'd like to personally thank everybody who has responded in such a wonderful way. It's heartwarming to get such great feedback and positive responses to this effort.

For those of you who are unfamiliar with the Celebrate 120 drive, here's the details: This year, we're celebrating the 120th anniversary of the founding of Bethlehem Lutheran Church in Longmont. As we all know, this has been a very challenging time for many folks and institutions. You may recall getting a letter from our treasurer Greg Schuman recently to let everybody know that we are falling behind on our budget for 2021. While we knew that the budgeting process was going to be challenging, we still had to construct a budget for 2021, and we made several commitments to various parties that we have kept.

In order to keep our ongoing commitments and help bridge the funding gap we're experiencing currently, we've come up with a plan to raise some additional funds while simultaneously celebrating our 120th anniversary and hopefully have some fun. The plan is to ask each member to provide an additional \$120 beyond what they were already giving in 2021. In addition, for every extra \$120 received, the donating member will receive credit for a private screening of a movie at the Longmont Theatre Company. The drive will run through October, and we'll wrap everything up in November with a jambalaya cookoff in the stable area.

So now that you're brought up to speed, I'd like to report that we've gotten some great response to the campaign. I'm extremely happy to report that we have one member of the congregation who has committed to match any individual donations of \$1,200.00, up to two separate donations. So if you're planning on making a gift, please keep in mind that if you give \$1,200 or more, your gift will be matched. That's an extremely generous commitment and I'm humbled by it. I'm hopeful that this will be just the start of what looks to be a tremendously successful campaign and I look forward to providing you regular updates as we work through the next several weeks. #### **Donate**

The Habitat ReStore at 1351 Sherman Street is a second-hand store for furniture, housewares, building supplies, and tools. They are looking for your donations in October; they accept donations Wednesday to Saturday 10:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Should you have larger furniture or functioning appliances you can call 720-303-3334 ext 201 and they can arrange a pick up for you.

The sales generated by Habitat ReStore typically brings in enough proceeds to pay for the building of one Habitat home each year. With churches getting congregational involvement in this challenge, it would be great to double that!

#### Build

- 9 homes at East Rogers Road (near Martin Street)
- 8 homes at Mountain Brook (west of Home Depot and Hover)
- 26 Tiny Houses for Veterans (a joint venture with the Veterans and Habitat's management)
- Land has been acquired for 35 more homes of which 5 will be in Estes Park.
- Funds have been secured to perform 10 repairs on homes in the Glens (Dacono)
