Rev's Revelations



"Give thanks with a grateful heart, give thanks to the Holy One, give thanks because he's given Jesus Christ, his Son." (**Give Thanks**, hymn by Henry Smith)

I'm always slightly amused by the Thanksgiving Day. In the US, the holiday is rooted in sharing abundance. We recall stories—whether true or tales—of pilgrims being welcomed by and eating with natives of this land. The moral of the Thanksgiving story is based in gratitude. Today, many people gather for prayer to give thanks to God. We give thanks for being who we are, where we are, when we are (yes, even in a pandemic). We gather around tables filled with turkey, stuffing, potatoes, gravy, and of course, pie. Eating 'til our hearts' content and often past that point. Then, we lounge around all afternoon and evening until we have just a little more room for some leftovers.

For many years, that Thanksgiving Day is followed by Black Friday. With sales and deals just down the street, we move quickly, from giving thanks to wanting more. This cultural Thanksgiving Day is very different than the way we talk about thanksgiving in the church.

You might recognize that every time we share communion in worship, we begin with what's called the *Great Thanksgiving*. If you don't recognize that title, you know the words: *The Lord be with you*. *And also with you*. *Lift up your hearts*. *We lift them to the Lord*. *Let us give thanks to the Lord our God*. *It is right to give God thanks and praise*...

Thanksgiving is what Jesus did in the holy meal: On the night in which he was betrayed our Lord Jesus took bread, gave thanks, broke it and gave it to his disciples... Thanksgiving is what we mimic, share, and celebrate in the service of communion. And Jesus didn't do that only at the table with his disciples. He broke bread and gave thanks other times (such as at the feeding of the 5,000 and after his resurrection on the road to Emmaus).

Jesus' thankfulness in communion is lived out in his generosity throughout his entire life.

We too can give thanks throughout life. We can give thanks on the secular Thanksgiving Day, on Black Friday, on a Monday or Tuesday, on any day and at any time. During the pandemic, we have learned, that it might even be appropriate to engage liturgy outside the sanctuary by celebrating the *Great Thanksgiving in our own homes*.

As you give thanks this month, I encourage you to reflect on two of the core beliefs and values named by BLC members:

We believe that... **God inspires people** throughout history and the Christian church especially in: the Lutheran Confessions, Baptism, Communion, creeds, and our faith partners.

And,

We value **Growing Generosity** – We value God's abundant creation and seek to grow in giving our time, talents and treasures in response to God's generosity.

What does thankfulness mean to you? How does generosity intertwine with thankfulness or gratitude? How will you celebrate Thanksgiving this season?

November 7 – All Saints' Sunday

Of all three years of the lectionary cycle, this year's All Saints readings have the most tears. Isaiah and Revelation look forward to the day when God will wipe away all tears; in John's gospel, Jesus weeps along with Mary and all the gathered mourners before he demonstrates his power over death. On All Saints Day we celebrate the victory won for all the faithful dead, but we grieve for our beloved dead as well, knowing that God honors our tears. We bring our grief to the table and find there a foretaste of Isaiah's feast to come. Edited from Sundays and Seasons

November 14

November begins with All Saints Day and ends in or near Advent, when we anticipate Christ's coming again. It is fitting, then, that the readings today tell of the final resurrection and the end time. In the turmoil of hope, fear, and disbelief that these predictions provoke in us, Hebrews sounds a note of confident trust. Christ makes a way for us where there is no way, and we walk it confidently, our hearts and bodies washed in baptismal water, trusting the one who has promised forgiveness. The more we see the last day approaching, the more important it is to meet together to provoke one another to love. Edited from Sundays and Seasons

November 21 – Christ the King

Even after Israel had experienced the vagaries of kings, the people still longed for a true king to set things right. He would have the king's title of Anointed One (Messiah); he would be the "one like a human being" (Son of Man) given dominion in Daniel's vision. Jesus is given these titles, even though he is nothing like an earthly king. His authority comes from the truth to which he bears witness, and those who recognize the truth voluntarily listen to him. November 28 – Advent 1: Hanging of the Greens

Faith Formation: Gary is off and running; Sunday School is back in gear with a consistent number of kids every Sunday. The team plans to start scheduling kids' events and see what the comfort level is for gathering together.

Property: Matt and Chili have blown out the sprinklers for the winter; there is a property meeting scheduled for Sunday, Oct 17, 2021, and Matt hopes to get a council chair. Mission: Thanks to Naomi Circle for planning and serving the OUR Center lunch on 9/26/21; BLC will again serve lunch in November. Thanks to Matt for making a video for an application grant; The Nicaragua Project received a \$3000 grant. SJI is hosting the Share the Grace drive on Reformation Sunday, October 31, to collect items for those released from the Denver Women's Prison or from the Aurora Immigration Detention Center and will also collect items to support the New Beginnings ReEntry program. **Stewardship:** The Celebrate 120 campaign

started slowly but picked up a little in the last two weeks; we have received two \$1200 donations for the match! Eric wants to increase the number of donors now and additional talks are planned. The annual Pledge Drive plans are being made for a kick-off on November 14. **Worship:** Jim said it has been a pretty good month with the new worship team; they split out responsibilities, and he thinks the plan will work pretty well. There is a need for volunteers for November and December; planning for Advent and Christmas through the end of year continues.

Summary of Council Meeting Minutes October 12, 2021:

The Council met on October 12, 2021, with Matt James, Mark Abromski, Jenny Kelley, Greg Schumann, Pr. Katie Chullino, Bob Lee, Brian Carlson, Mark Holste, Eric Kittelberger, and Jim Woodruff in attendance. Matt called the meeting to order at 7:05 p.m. Following the devotions and prayer, it was noted that minutes from the last council meeting were approved by email and made available in the library. One item of business was approved by email since the last council meeting. Mark H moved that council approve a request from the Social Justice Initiative to hold a Share the Grace event on October 31 (details are in the Mission monthly report); Greg seconded the motion and the motion passed by email vote.

FINANCIAL REPORTS: Greg reported that general envelope giving significantly increased and the monthly net was only several hundred down last month compared to the previous months. He thanks all who caught up with pledges and general giving and to ministries and staff who watched their budget spending. The mortgage has been paid off and will show up on November financial reports! We are beginning the process of planning budgets for each ministry area; if a ministry area proposes an addition to last year's budget, please include a justification; if a line item is no longer needed, take it out of the budget. Start planning temple talks from all ministries to explain and justify the proposed ministry area budget for the congregation and staff.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS

• Pandemic Advisory Group recommendations: Matt reported the group has not met so there are no changes at this time. Matt received some of the HVAC airflow information from Timberline and did calculations regarding airflow in the sanctuary, and Jenny reviewed the research papers on airflow requirements for safely meeting and singing. The PAG will meet to review and make recommendations regarding space utilization and consideration of ionization filters for the sanctuary and fellowship hall.

NEW BUSINESS

- Website donation page: Jenny demonstrated and explained the new Vanco Online web donation page. She also reviewed what will be required to add anything new for different activities and projects that come up during the year in the various ministry areas.
- Exec session: 7:58 p.m. Matt moved, and Greg seconded the motion to enter executive session. Greg moved and Jim seconded the motion to exit the executive session at 8:32 p.m.

Following prayer considerations and the Lord's Prayer, the meeting adjourned at 8:45 p.m. The next Council meeting will be Tuesday, November 9, 2021, at 7:00 p.m.

Pandemic Advisory Group



BLC Guidelines for Group Gatherings (as of October 18, 2021)

These guidelines are based on current CDC, State of Colorado, Boulder County and Rocky Mountain Synod guidelines for group gatherings. They are reviewed by the Pandemic Advisory Group, approved by the BLC church council, and updated as new pandemic information becomes available.

- 1. Group Gatherings may include up to 12 or 30 people (see spaces available information below) who are following social distancing recommendations per the latest CDC, State of Colorado, Boulder County, and Rocky Mountain Synod guidelines. Where there are discrepancies, groups should follow the strictest advice whether it is from one of these organizations or from BLC:
 - a. (Bethlehem Lutheran Church :: COVID-19 News and Plans.
 - b. CDC: https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/index.html
 - c. State of Colorado: https://covid19.colorado.gov/
 - d. Boulder County: Indoor Mask Order Boulder County
 - e. Rocky Mountain Synod: https://www.rmselca.org/corona-virus
- 2. Every gathering must have a designated leader. The gathering group leader has the following responsibilities:
 - a. Sign up to use designated space (pavilion/stable area, courtyard, fellowship hall, library Fireside room, or youth room) at least 72 hours in advance of gathering. Call 303-776-3290 to reserve a space and time.
 - b. Ensure that someone in the group has a key if indoor access is needed. (Note: Keys require background checks.)
 - c. Please see the church website for updates before your event

(<u>https://bethlehem-lutheran.net/gather/covid-19-news-and-plans.html</u>). Share the most current BLC mask rules with the group.

- d. For indoor events: ensure that tables used are wiped down after the event (and before if you would like). Staff will let you know where supplies are when you reserve space. Please notify staff if you see a shortage of supplies.
- e. For outdoor events: ensure group members know to bring their own chairs if needed. (Note: there are picnic tables in the stable, benches near the stable, and benches in the pavilion.)
- f. Share with group members if another person in the group has become sick with COVID-19 in the 14 days following the event.
- 3. All individuals at the gathering must:
 - a. Have no COVID-19 symptoms. (For a list of symptoms see:

https://covid19.colorado.gov/covid19-symptoms)

- b. Have no known exposure to anyone with COVID-19 in the past 14 days
- c. Report to group leader if they develop COVID-19 symptoms or test positive for COVID-19 in the 14 days following gathering

- d. Remain six feet apart from individuals who do not live in their home.
- e. If inside, wear a mask while at the gathering. You may not enter the BLC building without a mask. (For mask guidance see: Your Guide to Masks | CDC.) Be advised that Boulder County Health department inspectors are visiting churches and issuing citations if people are found inside in violation of the mask requirements. The third violation (by anyone) could result in BLC being closed.
- f. Not cross between other groups which might be meeting in other spaces.
- 4. Groups have a two hour time-frame. These two hours include your time for set-up and clean-up.
- 5. Groups must understand that the gathering will be canceled by the church if COVID-19 rates or guidelines indicate it necessary. Groups must also understand the gathering may be cancelled due to bad weather. Moving inside may or may not be an option. Consult with the office if you need an indoor back-up plan.
- 6. Trash must be collected and placed in the dumpster in the white fence enclosure.
- 7. People are asked to bring their own chairs, food and beverages (non-alcoholic only).
- 8. No staff, volunteer, council, or church member will be required to attend your gathering. If they are invited to attend, they are considered in your group gathering count of people.
- 9. Groups meeting indoors are allowed to drink and eat inside by following the instructions that are given by airlines: "pull your mask down, take a drink or bite, and then immediately pull your mask back in place." This compromise, much like using the communion kits during worship, should allow groups to remain responsible and enjoy food and drink.
- 10.All travelers who have attended a high risk event or been in a high risk area, especially international travelers, should wait at least (5) days from the day of return to participate in BLC worship and events or have a negative COVID-19 test result at least three days after return.

Additional Suggestions:

- 1. Bring a few disposable masks for participants who may forget. If you do not have extra masks, contact the church office. Be advised that Boulder County Health department inspectors are visiting churches and issuing citations if people are found inside in violation of the mask requirements.
- Bring a bottle of hand sanitizer. There are also sanitizing units at the main doors and the north doors.
- 3. Bring bug repellent and sunscreen for outdoor events.
- 4. Encourage group members to each bring a bottle of water.
- 5. Offer Zoom meetings or phone calls with group members unable to participate in an inperson gathering.

Musical Freedom



A Program inside the Colorado Department of Corrections Musical Freedom is a program inside both Denver Women's Correctional Facility and Colorado Correctional Center in Golden providing piano, violin, viola, cello, and vocal lessons

to incarcerated individuals. Jeanne P. has been active in this program for over five years and is reaching out to her home congregation for financial assistance. "As we cannot charge the inmates for music lessons, we rely entirely on charitable donations to pay our instructors a stipend, purchase instruments, strings, lesson materials, etc."

"Music changes the brain in very positive ways and, since 97% of these individuals will once again return to society, we want them to come out with changed attitudes, outlooks on life, and behaviors. The connection between a music teacher and music student allows for one-on-on mentoring which is important to their developing new outlooks on life and new attitudes toward society. We want them to return to society with new skills and be successful contributing members of society. We are in need of volunteer music teachers to expand this program and encourage anyone with a music background to contact Jeanne at 720-838-3888 or jeanne@phippsweb.com."

It's been a few weeks since we provided an update on the Celebrate 120 fundraising campaign, so I wanted to bring everybody up to speed. The numbers are encouraging, but we still have some work to do. Thus far, we've received \$8,403 in contributions, with two individual \$1,200 contributions that are being matched to bring our total to \$10,803. There are 12 donors who contributed \$240 or more. Those folks have qualified for the private movie screening at the Longmont Theater. Special thanks to all who have contributed and to the BLC member who has pledged to match the two \$1,200 contributions. This is making a real difference. It's helping keep our programing in place and helping a lot of people in our community and elsewhere. Our goal with this campaign was to get as many folks contributing \$120 or more as possible. If there is one area where we appear to be lagging, it's in the number of folks who have participated. With a total of 31 donors out of roughly 200 BLC members, there is still a lot of room for us to finish out the campaign strong.
