Rev's Revelations



*Through God's abundant love we invite, welcome, and serve **as a light in the world.***

Throughout this year, we have pondered our mission statement--one "star word" at a time. For the next few months, we will focus on the last phrase in the statement **as a light in the world.**

*"God created the world with light (Genesis 1) and we believe that light helps us to see God's abundant love. The star over Bethlehem shone as a visible sign of God's presence in the world (Matthew 2). Jesus is the light of the world (John 8:12) and calls his followers to be the light of the world (Matthew 5)." (from the BLC Strategic Planning Team explanation of *light*.)*

In the bible, *light* stems from the story of creation and grows into Jesus' call for us to be a light in the world. There's a greater light and a lesser light. The pattern of evening and morning, darkness and light, gives way for the rest of creation exist--darkness for rest and growth, light to wake and work.

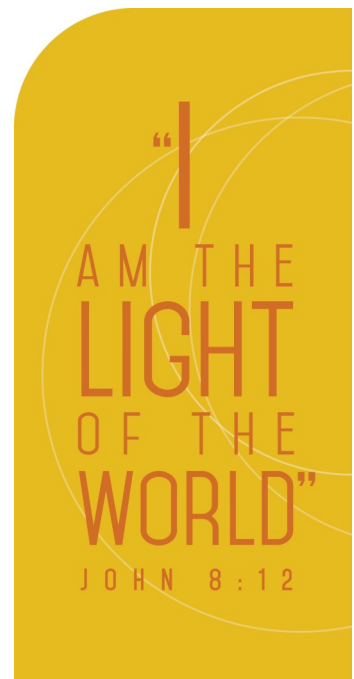
This month we begin a new year of faith formation with the commission: *Be a light!* As we emphasize this with children, youth, and adults, I invite you to ponder the Star word *light* as it is related to creation and living. What is *light*? We'll eventually get to the conversations about the star over Bethlehem and Jesus. But for now, I want us to think about the most basic use of *light*--nothing too theological or philosophical.

What--scientifically speaking--is *light*? Where does it come from? How does *light* (and darkness, too) affect your daily living? What work do you do in the *light*? How do you rest in the darkness? Tending to our physical bodies--giving ourselves work and rest--is how we are created to live.

Once you have pondered that, begin thinking about your spirit. What is *light* for your spirit, or mind, or heart? What things feel like they work or grow your spirit/mind/heart? What things challenge you and empower you? What things give your spirit/mind/heart a sort of darkness, or lesser light, for rest?

September 4 - 13th Sunday after Pentecost

Today's scriptures call us to contemplate the cost of discipleship. Strengthened by the company and forgiveness of Christ in holy communion and recalling God's grace in remembrance of baptism, we can be strengthened in this hour to "choose life"—to choose life in God as our own.

Readings: Deuteronomy 30:15-20, Luke 14:25-33

September 11 - 14th Sunday after Pentecost

The grumbling of the religious leaders in today's gospel is actually our holy hope: This Jesus welcomes sinners and eats with them. That our God seeks and saves the lost is not only a holy hope, it is our only hope. As the writer of 1 Timothy reminds us, "The saying is sure and worthy of full acceptance, that Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners." Thanks be to God.

Readings: Psalm 51:1-10, Luke 15:1-10

September 18 - 15th Sunday after Pentecost

As we are invited today to consider what it means to be managers (rather than owners) of all that we have, it is crucial to recognize that we are bought with a price. "Christ Jesus, himself human, . . . gave himself a ransom for all." Apart from the generosity of God we have nothing—we are nothing. By God's gracious favor we have everything we need.

Readings: Amos 8:4-7, 1 Timothy 2:1-7, Luke 16:1-13

September 25 - 16th Sunday after Pentecost

Consideration of and care for those in need (especially those "at our gate," visible to us, of whom we are aware) is an essential component of good stewardship. It is in the sharing of wealth that we avoid the snare of wealth. It is the one whom death could not hold—who comes to us risen from the dead—who can free us from the death grip of greed.

Readings: Amos 6:1a, 4-7; 1 Timothy 6:6-19 or Luke 16:19-31

Council Meeting

Summary of Council Meeting Minutes:
August 9, 2022

CALL TO ORDER: Matt James called the meeting to order at 7:03 p.m. Attending: Pr. Katie Chullino, Matt James, Steve Dawson, Jenny Kelley, Greg Schumann, Alex Hoime, Mark Holste, Jamie Updegraff, Todd Propp, and Jim Woodruff. Absent: Cindy Tayler.

DEVOTIONS AND PRAYER: Pr. Katie spoke about the mission statement "light to the world" and the focus on teaching of the light concept in a positive way. This week's focus was on Genesis 1. What does light show us about God's love? What illuminates God's love?

MINUTES OF PREVIOUS MEETING: These were approved via email and posted in the library. There was one vote by email in July. Matt James moved that we charter Cub Scout Pack 65 as proposed by Pr. Katie. Jenny Kelley seconded the motion; the motion was approved with eight yes votes. Matt James will be the chartered organization representative for Bethlehem.

FINANCIAL REPORTS: Greg reports that there was about \$10,000 more in donations than June but we are still \$4,000 down from budget. We must take into account the pledges that have been completely paid for the year. A letter to the congregation went out with the Q2 donation statements.

Expenses are being less than budget which helps so we are doing okay. However, we have anticipated property expenses coming up.

Note that our endowment funds, based on investments, have taken a hit this year, as have all investments, which makes it very unlikely that those worship funds and scholarship funds for this year will be available. Greg has alerted those committees.

All ministry chairs should be working on their budgets now; our annual meeting will be coming up quickly in early December, and we must have a budget to present! Matt moved to approve the financial report as presented. Todd seconded the motion, and it passed unanimously.

REPORT HIGHLIGHTS

Pastor / Staff / Ministry: Pr. Katie reported movie night went well, and we would love to do it again in the fall—perhaps October with *Hocus-Pocus* trunk or treat, etc. Thanks to all who helped make it happen!

Missions: Mark highlighted SJL and the packs for Casa de Paz—who were very appreciative.

Stewardship: No report.

Faith Formation: Jamie highlighted the busy summer—VBS was a great success with great leadership from Sue Smith; there was a refund credit from Group so VBS came in under budget; campers attended Sky Ranch; the community movie night was successful; and a family swim on August 28 at Updegraff's neighborhood pool is upcoming. Rally day is August 21; the theme is "Be a Light."

Challenges include: to get people out in July with maybe more planning and advertising ahead of time next year. Faith Formation would like to coordinate with other ministry teams and encourage communication between the ministries for plans and events. Upcoming in the fall: Confirmation, 1st Communion classes, and movie nights will start back up.

Worship: Jim was in WY for most of July dealing with replacement scheduling. The Music & Worship committee met and discussed worship and music ideas through the end of the year. Due to finances and persistent pandemic

issues, choir is not feasible for now through the end of the year so they will not pursue the position for this year. Small groups and volunteers will step up to provide music for now.

Property: Alex reported that several expenses have just come through or will shortly: replace backflows and fire sprinkler service, which were approved in July, and are scheduled for August. Our van has been leased for up to three months, and several requests have been made for the use of the bus (see new business). Alex is planning to schedule another property work day soon to complete work on the landscaping and free up the rest of the irrigation system. Electrical issues have been addressed. Thinking about ways to use the donated landscape boulders—conversations about a community garden; remove the spruces on the west border and replace with boulders; other ideas? Todd suggests a weekday work day for retirees participation, in addition to a regular weekend workday. Question re HVAC status: we are now repairing units as needed and not replacing due to cost of replacement (\$32K). Plans for the future may include a campaign for the Capital Fund.

Pr. Katie reports that Andrea Becker expressed thank you on behalf of the preschool for the additional support and communication in the last couple of years. Andrea also requested help with: 1) placing the mats on the playground under the wood chips; 2) power washing the windows and cleaning the blinds; and 3) a need to check window locks.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS

Preschool Committee / Board: In addition to the property requests from the preschool director, Pr. Katie reports the Preschool Team meets tomorrow evening. Members are working through the paperwork and crafting current documents.

Longmont K9 Training: P. Katie reports this is still pending.

Cub Scout Pack 65 / Troop 65: Matt signed paperwork after the vote to approve chartering Pack 65. There is a possibility we may be

asked to charter Troop 65 as well but are waiting for the official request.

NEW BUSINESS

- Bus Use Requests
- 1. Habitat for Humanity: Sept 13 to take folks to Estes Park —consensus to table pending more information.
- 2. Gary Knutson request: Sept 16 & 18 Gary requested for the family of a youth director.
- 3. Fall Theological Conference: Sept 19–23 trip to Park City, UT and back.

Matt moved to approve the second and third requests; Greg seconded. The motion passed unanimously.

- Girl Scout Requests:
 - In conjunction with earning their Babysitting Badge, the Girl Scouts would like to hold a Parents' Night Out on a Friday with popcorn and water. Jenny moved to approve the request as discussed (one event for BLC, LOC, Cornerstone, Scouts families using the Girl Scout guidelines and Safe Haven policy for ratio of children to adults); Todd seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.
 - Bakesale: Girl Scout troop would like to hold a bake sale in November/December. Greg made a motion to approve the Girl Scout bake sale with the date contingent on not conflicting with Nicaragua bakesale dates; Alex seconded the motion, and it passed unanimously.
 - Garage Sale: Girl Scouts want to hold a garage sale Labor Day Weekend Saturday (9/3) in the church parking lot. Consensus is to table this request pending answers to questions.
- Musical Freedom Funding Request: There was a request from Jeanne Phipps to add the Musical Freedom program as a line item in our annual budget. After discussion, Mark will respond to the request regarding the funds; Pr. Katie will respond to the email response regarding additional questions. Faith Formation Director will be working with

Jeanne on scheduling an Adult Forum for Musical Freedom.

- Update on New Beginnings Ministry: Pr. Katie provided an update on the New Beginnings Ministry. The New Beginnings Ministry is still active at the Women's prison. Pr. Schjang meets regularly with both a bible study group and the NB inside council group. There is also a small service allowed every other Saturday within defined hours. However, large meetings (including regular services, GED classes, other educational programs, etc.) have been on hold by the warden for a number of months due to safety concerns because of the prison staff shortage; they are down to only about 1/3 of their usual number of officers. As soon as that is corrected, larger groups and services will resume. We will continue our prayers and support for the New Beginnings ministry.
- Christmas & New Year services: Pr. Katie indicated that both Christmas and New Year's fall on a Sunday this year; council consensus recommended having one service at 9:15 a.m. on these Sundays. Alex moved to allow Gary a Sunday off on 12/25/2022 and to allow Pr. Katie a Sunday off on 1/1/2023. Jim seconded the motion, and it passed unanimously.
- Growing Gardens Urban Farming request: a group in partnership with YMCA and school programs is looking for land and a new partner for their garden/education program (see attached information). After discussion, this request is tabled pending more information. We discussed creating a land use team to explore multiple possibilities for our land.

Following prayer considerations and The Lord's Prayer, Matt adjourned the meeting at 9:10 p.m. Next Council meeting will be Tuesday, Sept. 13, 2022 @ 7:00 p.m. Exec meeting is at 6:30 p.m. Note: Full minutes of the council meetings are available in the Fireside Library, along with council ministry reports.

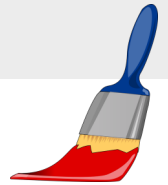

From Fear to Despair to Hope

"Meeting" Ruth changed my life! Ruth was detained in a prison-like detention facility for nearly three years after legally entering the United States to ask for asylum. She did not see the sun, feel the breeze on her cheek, or even step outside for the duration of her detention. She suffered untreated health issues, food deprivation, the inability to stay warm in the winter, and acute depression during her stay. Her country of origin is the politically charged and dangerous Democratic Republic of the Congo (DRC).

Ruth is one of the thousands of detainees incarcerated in the US that can request a pen pal through Casa de Paz. Several of our congregation members have trained and volunteered to be pen pals through Casa de Paz. Ruth was my very first pen pal. We shared letters and concerns for the last year of her detention. In August of 2021 her case finally came before the immigration judge. Based on her family's experiences in DRC, Ruth was granted permission to stay in the US under the category "Protection from Torture". But that didn't end her challenge. She joined a cousin's already crowded home and began her wait for her work permit and social security number. She could not get a driver's license, open a bank account, cash a check or get a job while she waited! She felt worthless and useless. Through all her emotional ups and downs we have communicated several times a week on WhatsApp. I have been able to see her face and feel the depth of her emotion on WhatsApp video.

Ten days ago the magic happened. She now has her documents! Last week she started working in order fulfillment for Amazon while studying for the national test for Certified Nurse Assistant. Next week she will take the test for her driver's license. Ruth's story has one of the infrequent satisfying endings for detained persons. I have been blessed to be part of Ruth's journey.

Although we have yet to meet in person I do believe that will happen. Ruth hopes to "rebuild

her life" in Colorado. I will be searching for a home with a room to rent (with kitchen privileges), or a small apartment that she might afford on limited income. Maybe she will join us all as a Coloradan!

Apple Cinnamon Waffles

Ingredients

- 1-1/2 cups all-purpose flour
- 1/2 cup whole wheat flour
- 1 tablespoon baking powder
- 2 teaspoons packed brown sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 3 eggs, separated
- 1 cup milk
- 1/4 cup melted butter, plus extra for waffle iron
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1/2 sweet apple, such as Fuji or Gala, cored, and grated

Instructions

1. Preheat waffle iron.
2. In a bowl, whisk together flours, baking powder, brown sugar, cinnamon, and salt.
3. In the bowl of a stand mixer, beat egg whites until soft peaks form. Set aside.
4. In another bowl, whisk together egg yolks, milk, butter, and vanilla. Stir egg yolk mixture into dry mixture until combined (some lumps are fine). Gently fold in egg whites, then fold in apple.
5. Brush melted butter over hot waffle iron. Spoon batter into waffle iron and cook for 3 to 5 minutes, or until nicely browned.
