Rev's Revelations



The month of January 2023 was nothing like I had planned. As I write this newsletter article from my isolation suite (aka: the parsonage basement), I have not worshiped in our sanctuary yet this year. After a relaxing holiday on January 1, I was ready to dive into the new year--to visit a few homebound members during this holiday season, to enjoy a few more days of Christmas decorations, to walk with families during holy moments of grief.

Then, my own 30-year-old cousin died, unexpectedly. I spent 10 days with my family in Iowa. I missed two funerals in our Bethlehem community. I missed two Sundays of worship and fellowship. (Thanks to Zoom, I didn't miss our January council meeting!) And, I missed those few more days surrounded by Christmas decorations. When I arrived home, my spouse had taken down our tree and carefully packed our ornaments. Also, when I arrived home, I tested positive for Covid19, which meant that I missed de-decorating at Bethlehem, too.

My time in isolation has giving me the opportunity to sit with some guilt and grief this past week--wishing I had been here to do the things and also wishing I was still with my extended family, wishing I had been more diligent with masking while traveling and also wishing I had just a few more days to take in the joyful light of those Christmas and Chrismons trees. Then, I received this poem from Father Teri at Light of Christ ECC:

The Work of Christmas Begins

- by Michael Dougherty, a variation on Howard Thurman's, When the Song of the Angels is Stilled

When the carols have been stilled,
When the star-topped tree is taken down,
When family and friends are gone home,
When we are back to our schedules
The work of Christmas begins:
To welcome the refugee,
To heal a broken planet,
To feed the hungry,
To build bridges of trust, not walls of fear,
To share our gifts,
To seek justice and peace for all people,
To bring Christ's light to the world.

January--the month of Christmas and Epiphany and the celebration of the light guiding the magi to Jesus-was not what I planned or expected. The star-topped tree, the carols, the family and friends are gone. And, I'm back to a "normal" schedule--which in the life of a pastor means little regularity. But, also, I can see the work of Christmas beginning here at Bethlehem--in the budding ministries of the Immigration Focus Group, the Land Stewardship Team, the After School Fun & Food program, as well as in the annual mission trip!

As we transition from the Christmas and Epiphany seasons into ordinary time and into Lent (yes, that happens at the end of February!), I see the work of Christmas, I see Christ's light shining because of each of youThanks for being a light in the world.

February 5 - 5th Sunday after Epiphany

Light shines in the darkness for the upright, the psalmist sings. Isaiah declares that when we loose the bonds of injustice and share our bread with the hungry, the light breaks forth like the dawn. February 12 - 6th Sunday after Epiphany

In today's reading from Deuteronomy we are called to choose life by loving and obeying God. Much of today's gospel reading echoes portions of the Ten Commandments. Jesus' instructions to the crowd reveal a pattern of behavior that honors both God and the neighbor, resulting in life and health for the whole community. We too are invited to embrace these commandments, not out of fear of retribution, but because God has promised that to do so means life for us.

February 19 - Transfiguration of Our Lord

Today's festival is a bridge between the Advent-Christmas-Epiphany cycle that comes to a close today and the Lent-Easter cycle that begins in several days. On a high mountain Jesus is revealed as God's beloved Son, echoing the words at his baptism. This vision of glory sustains us as Jesus faces his impending death in Jerusalem. We turn this week to Ash Wednesday and our yearly baptismal journey from Lent to Easter. Some churches put aside the alleluia at the conclusion of today's liturgy. This word of joy will be omitted during the penitential season of Lent and will be sung again at Easter. **Readings**: Exodus 24:12-18, Matthew 17:1-9

February 22 - Ash Wednesday

Is this the fast that I choose?

Is this the fast that I choose? As we begin our series, we must examine if our actions match what we profess. As we practice seeking this Lent, what kind of fast will you choose? How will you live your faith? How will you live the questions of your faith? In our spiritual practices, will we seek to loose the bonds of injustice, to undo the thongs of the yoke, to let the oppressed go free, and to break every yoke? (Isaiah 58:6) **Readings**: Isaiah 58 1-12

February 26 - 1st Sunday in Lent

Seeking: Who will you listen to?

In order to engage in the spiritual practice of seeking, we must maintain a posture of listening, staying open and curious instead of calloused and closed off. In our focal texts for this week, we see two different examples of listening. Seeking the fruit of the garden, Adam and Eve allow the snake's manipulative voice to become louder than God's voice. In the wilderness, Jesus defies the deception of the tempter by listening intuitively — to God, to his inner moral compass, to the teachings of his faith. And so, who will you listen to? What sources do you seek for news, information, and media? Whose voices — and what messages — take up too much space in your head? From the onslaught of messaging we receive, we are invited to choose carefully. Faith practices can help us listen and filter what we're hearing to discern God's voice.

Readings: Genesis 2:15-17, 3:1-7, Matthew 4:1-11

Lent 2023

Our Lenten theme this year is, "Seeking: Honest Questions For Deeper Faith" and comes from A Sanctified Art, LLC with this description: The lectionary for Year A offers us many stories of Jesus encountering people who are seeking: Nicodemus comes to him in the veil of night, he approaches a Samaritan woman at a well, he heals a man born without sight. In these stories, each person is seeking a new beginning, a different life, a deeper faith. What unfolds is an exchange filled with questions and exploration. Often, an unveiling occurs — assumptions are disrupted, a new perspective is revealed, mystery grows... Like the characters in our Lenten



scriptures, we are also seeking many things: clarity, connection, wonder, justice, balance. We are seeking our calling, the sacred, and how to live as a disciple.

Throughout the turbulence of the past few years, many of us are asking big questions about our lives and our faith. If you are returning to church, you are probably returning with more questions and a critical lens. We hope this series will help us unpack some of those big questions in ways that are honest and faithful. Throughout this season, we hope you will continually ask yourself: what am I seeking? What is God seeking? This Lent, we invite you to engage in the spiritual practice of seeking. We encourage you to stay curious, open, and nimble. We hope you will soften your assumptions and expand your perspectives. We pray that these questions will create a safe space to explore — to be drawn more deeply into the fullness of life, into the heart of God. Council Meeting Minutes January 10, 2023-Approved Respectfully submitted by Cindy Thompson, BLC Council secretary

CALL TO ORDER: Mark Holste called the meeting to order at 7:04 p.m.

MINUTES OF PREVIOUS MEETING: approved via email and posted

- Motion - New Year New Socks - approved via email

FINANCIAL REPORTS: Greg reported we did not meet budget in December (which was expected) - with 15,000 short in general fund. Income for January is looking reasonable. We have approximately two months of expenses in the bank. Ministries need to look at their individual line items to make sure they know where their ministry dollars are going and what funds are remaining. Steve moved to accept the financial report, Glenn seconded. Motion carried.

REPORT HIGHLIGHTS (Pastor/Staff/Ministry): Pr. Katie shared that Lent planning is going on. Pr. Katie ordered a series for Lent (same publisher as Advent series). Andrea K. will preach on Sunday. She will also preside at funeral on Saturday, January 14th. Pr. Katie will be back Monday evening. Pr. Katie shared the process with the synod to have a replacement Pastor. The Council president must send a letter to the Bishop asking for someone such as Andrea to officiate. Normally a letter must be sent for each date a Pastor is needed. However, in this instance the Bishop approved for two consecutive Sundays.

Stewardship: Mike reported that he will be meeting with

Stewardship: Mike reported that he will be meeting with Pr. Katie and Jenny Kelley in the future regarding the timely basis/reality of commitments. Mike asked if Cornerstone Preschool is applicable for special funding from the state. Mark said they are applicable and the preschool advisory team discussed this funding at Monday 1/9 meeting.

Evangelism: Cindy submitted her January report to council via email. She will send an update regarding the After School Program meeting scheduled for Wednesday, January 11th.

Missions: Cathy reported that there is a newly formed focus group from the social justice initiative. The group is exploring various ways to live out our faith to immigrants. Contact Cathy if you are interested in joining this focus group. She thanked everyone that has been giving time and finances and also everyone that gave socks.

Property: Glenn reported \$11,600 is needed for the sprinkler/suppression system repair. Greg said this amount was already approved from last year's budget. Glenn said a minimum of \$9612 is needed to take care of the settling/floor lift issue. Glenn would like permission for BLC to try fundraising for this expense. Mark moved to allow a special fundraiser to occur to raise funds to take care of the "settling/floor left" issue with the understanding that any excess in funds would go the capital improvement to fund such things as the preschool fence or air conditioning. Greg seconded. Discussion: timing is important because of the preschool. Preschool ends the last week of May and begins again in mid-August. Work would need to coordinate around Vacation Bible School (last week of June). The best windows would be right after May 30th and before VBS or after VBS. Motion carried. Glenn will meet with Pr.Katie regarding janitorial needs.

Council Notes (con't)

Worship: Sabrina reported the Chrismon tree will be coming down soon. It was difficult and chaotic the day it was erected in the worship center. More care will be taken during disassembly and parts will be labeled to assist with assembly next year. Sabrina asked where the binders are for each ministry that have been previously used. She would appreciate some direction of what has happened in the past and procedures to use for the future. Pr. Katie said we should have binders for each ministry - now a folder on the shared drive. Sabrina will work with Pr. Katie to find/see these materials.

Faith Formation: Jaime reported Advent nights occurred on Wednesday nights. Jaime lifted up Gary for his organization prior to his surgery. Caroling was canceled due to weather. The Children's Christmas program was a success. Jaime shared thanks to all the helpers. Upcoming: Cofirmands will meet with mentors. Family Sunday on Sunday - making pasta. Easter eggstravangza is in the planning stage.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS:

- Preschool Committee / Board: Mark shared that Jenny has been compiling an employee handbook based on a handbook from a church in California, Cornerstone preschool handbook and a previous BLC handbook. Once it is compiled it will be shared with Council for approval. Kudos to Jenny and Greg who have put a lot of work towards this document.
- Preschool Advisory Board: It is time to get a
 Preschool Advisory Board back in place so
 communication can occur regularly regarding
 Cornerstone Preschool. The Advisory Board
 would be comprised of Council President, Pr.
 Katie, 2-3 BLCers, and a parent of a
 Cornerstone preschooler. This board would
 meet quarterly. The responsibilities of this
 board is part of a past resolution passed by the
 congregation.

NEW BUSINESS

- Campus Ministry Guest Pastor Sunday February 12
 - Greg moved that we offer the guest Pastor
 a "love offering" for preaching on the 12th.
 Sabrina seconded. Discussion: Council
 discussed that a special offering will be
 accepted at both services and monies will
 be given to their campus ministry fund.
 Sabrina recommended an announcement
 be made a week prior to the congregation
 via the bulletin and announcements. An
 opportunity for cash, check and online
 giving will be communicated. Motion
 carried.
- Cathy shared that Bob Cotton would like to show videos regarding "Mercy Ships" here at Bethlehem. Council members discussed that there are probably several BLC members with a strong passion to share various missions with others here at Bethlehem. These members will be encouraged to share in the fellowship hall, forum or fireside room. Members may also put an article in the STAR including links/info on how to give or get involved with the mission they are shariing. If using the forum, members must coordinate with Gary. Summer would be a good time for these types of presentations. If presenters need tech support they may coordinate with Gary/Matt/Pr. Katie prior to their presentation. After discussion, Council consented to allow these presentations to occur. Cathy will let Bob know to coordinate with Gary/Matt/Pr. Katie to help with tech support and the options discussed by Council

NEW BUSINESS

- Staff Transitions
 - Office Coordinator: Nancy will begin working half-time March 1st with office hours from 9-1 Monday thru Friday. Council will be looking at reassignment/realignment of duties of current employees to fulfill remaining office coordinator tasks. Salary details will be worked out with Greg. No increase in budget is expected. Council consented to have a discussion with current employees.
 - Director of Cornerstone Preschool: Andrea will be retiring as Director of Cornerstone Preschool at the end of this school year (late May). Council wants to communicate that CP is part of our Faith Formation Ministry and is a Christian based ministry we support and is important to us. Executive Council will select an interview committee and interview internal candidates first. If internal candidate interviews are not successful, then the position will be open to external candidates. Mike mentioned that a more symbiotic relationship with BLC would be encouraged.
- Property: Further discussion will evolve regarding Glenn and getting property ministry more assistance.
- Choir is off and running once a month. Council will in the future discuss whether a stipend is needed for Betty. We'll wait and see how it goes and how Betty is handling the volunteer position and feeling about it.
- Financial Secretary: Mark will talk to Jenny and report back to Council on whether Jenny would like a financial secretary assistant to help her. Greg recommends Jenny continue with trends using anonymous information as it has been very helpful.
- Bus use procedure: Pr. Katie has put together a document on proper procedures for driving/using Josephine. Pr. Katie will send links to Council regarding these procedures.
- The Girl Scout troop that meets at Bethlehem would like to set up a cookie sales booth at Bethlehem on Sunday February 5th. Mark moved that this occur and Sabrina seconded. Motion carried.
- February 7th: The date for the February council meeting will be moved from Tuesday, February 14th to Tuesday, February 7th. Council unanimously consented.

Lenten Mentoring

Would you like to be a Mentor?

Intentional intergenerational (Generation to Generation) relationship building is one of the highlights our congregation needs to model for other congregations in the ELCA. This ministry helps us live out the church's vision to be an intergenerational community.

Lenten Faith Mentoring is a time where BLC's Confirmands are paired with adults (non-family members) of different ages. Each pair meets to get to know one another and share the journey to faith experience. Mentor groups will meet five times, on Wednesdays or Sundays, during the month of March (March 1, 8, 15, 22, 29).

Mentor meetings will last approximately 30-45 minutes and consist of sharing (highs and lows), reflecting (faith discussion) and prayer. Each week's Lenten theme is explored through a variety of discussion options. Use what works for your group and be open to where the Spirit might lead you in your reflections. The concept of mentoring is not about being right or wrong but sharing your personal experiences with one another in a trusting and caring environment!

Top Ten Ideas for Mentors

- 1. Pray frequently for your mentee and the mentoring relationship. Tell your mentee you are praying for them. Ask if they have anything specific they would like you to include in your prayers.
- 2. Meet your mentee's parent(s.)
- 3. Don't think you need to be an 'expert' or know everything.
- 4. Be authentic, transparent and vulnerable.
- 5. Read the discussion materials before each session.
- 6. Don't lecture or give a sermon it's a discussion! Listen!
- 7. Don't be afraid to say you don't know.
- 8. Value and affirm your mentee's thoughts, ideas and discussion.
- 9. Agree to maintain confidentiality between you and your mentee.
- 10. Have fun!

Top Ten Ideas for Mentees

- 1. Pray frequently for your mentor and the mentoring relationship. Tell your mentor you are praying for them. Ask if they have anything specific they would like you to include in your prayers.
- 2. Be yourself.
- 3. Get to know your mentor by asking lots of questions.
- 4. Be honest and open.
- 5. Answer questions with more than one or two word sentences it's a discussion! Listen!
- 6. Be willing to learn new things.
- 7. Value and affirm your mentor's thoughts, ideas and discussion.
- 8. Thank your mentor for their willingness to spend time with you.
- 9. Agree to maintain confidentiality between you and your mentor.
- 10. Have fun!

The Seven Dos of Mentoring

Be Consistent

I will be dependable and trustworthy as a mentor. To the best of my ability, I will honor my commitments and keep my promises. I will be there for the youth I am mentoring on a regular and consistent basis for as long as I am required to do so.

Be Yourself

Be a Listener

I will take every opportunity to be a good listener in my mentoring relationship. I will avoid judging and lecturing. I will listen attentively because I care, and because I desire to treat the youth I am mentoring with dignity and respect.

Be Honest

I will do my best to tell the truth always in my mentoring relationship, even when it hurts. In so doing, I will inspire the youth I am mentoring to be honest with me. When either of us is unsure of the truth, we will be honest with each other and seek to discover the truth together.

Be Patient and Forgiving

I will be realistic about the expectations I have for the youth I am mentoring. I will do my best to demonstrate unconditional love in every circumstance by being gracious, understanding, slow to anger, patient and forgiving. I will not allow failures to destroy our relationship.

Be Encouraging

I will bring out the best in the youth I am mentoring by being generous with affirmation, encouragement, gratitude, and praise. I will do all that I can to inspire my youth to dream dreams and to recognize the potential that he or she has in Christ Jesus.

Pray Hard

I will not become frustrated or discouraged because of my inability to change a young person's life. Instead, I will pray daily for the youth I am mentoring, and trust God to do what I cannot do.

My Long Term Support for Habitat for Humanity by Robert Cotton

I moved with my wife from Princeton, New Jersey in 1966. We purchased a home in Table Mesa on the south end of Boulder. We looked for a church that had a good Sunday School Program. We settled on Mount Calvary Lutheran Church. When the children were old enough, they both went to Sunday School there.

I was active at the church, was on council, got involved with Thrivent, and lts Twin Peaks Chapter. I started organizing volunteer groups to work on building homes for Flatirons Habitat For Humanity. I continued in this role for well over 15 years.

Pastor Mark Peterson presided at Mount Calvary from 1989 until 2005. He took a call to come to Bethlehem Lutheran Church. It coincidentally was the same time when our family moved to Longmont due to our son, John, and daughter-in-law, Nicole, who wanted us to move closer to them.

At Bethlehem Lutheran Church, I got involved right away with Saint Vrain Habitat For Humanity, and have been organizing build days for the members for 17 years! Typically I have 6 + persons working and I organize a build day every other month.

Actually, when we had the terrible flooding in 2013, I organized build groups every month for 2 years to work on the repairs to damaged homes. We were fortunate to have our own Ryan Bloemker working for St Vrain Habitat as their Critical Repairs Manager at that time.

In the 32 years I have organized build groups the estimated number of hours worked for Habitat would be $6 \times 6 \times 32 \times 8 = 9216$ hours minimum. Realistically More Than 10,000 hours! What about 2023? St Vrain Habitat is in the process of building 8 homes in the new Meadow Brook Development just one half mile to the west of Target, and Hover Street. Later they will be building 9 homes at East Rogers Road (west of Martin Street).
