Rev's Revelations



Last month, on Groundhog Day, I got a Facebook message from a church member. We had recently made plans to pray together before they would have surgery-which wasn't for a few more days. The message was a link to a post from another pastor, Lura Groen, and it began with this:

"PSA: your pastor *wants* you to call them when you need them. Your pastor *wants* to be there for you. You are not a burden. None of us became pastors because we want to do committee work and answer more emails. We became pastors for God, and for people. We love worship leadership, and being with you."

I nodded with agreement as I read the whole post--which included a bit about pastors complaining together when their people don't call when they're in the hospital or when something bad happens to them, which we totally do.

Specific instances came to mind, such as the time Ethel was upset because I didn't visit her in the hospital because she assumed the hospital just called the pastor when she was admitted. And the time I didn't get to Johnny's bedside before he passed because his family didn't know they could call the pastor "after hours." I also recalled that one time when I neglected to tell Bishop Jim--who is, in some ways a pastor to the pastors--that I was having surgery because I didn't think it was that big of a deal.

I share all of this because it feels lent-y. During the season of lent, we are immersed in stories of Jesus' journey to the cross, to the grave, and to new life. Accompaniment--which is what God shows us in Jesus--is one of the best parts of lent. In the stories we read during worship this season, we encounter God as one who walks with us in the entirety of life--and we seek that God. We seek to understand that God, to experience that God, to be more like that God. Our Lenten series this year guides us in that seeking, posing different questions each week to deepen our experience with God who is with us and who brings us together to be with each other.

As we journey this lent, I pose a question, too: Will you let me accompany you? Will you, please, call when you need a visit--and let your family know it's okay to call for emergencies, too? Will you look up my phone number in the directory (I promise, it's there) and add it to your contacts so that when you're in the hospital, or when your beloved passes, or when you have a rough day (or fantastic day!) you can call or text me?

P.S. There's no shame if you don't want or need me to know you're in the hospital or having surgery-just please know that pastors don't get psychic abilities in seminary and I can't know you want pastoral care if you don't tell me. Seriously, I'm happy to visit, listen to worries and hopes and dreams, share communion,

give a blessing, process life, or pray with you--it's literally what I went to school to do!



Sunday Worship

March 5 - 2nd Sunday in Lent

Nicodemus comes to Jesus under the veil of night to ask him big faith questions. As a leader of Jewish law, Nicodemus holds beliefs that no longer align with the kingdom of God Jesus embodies. Jesus invites him to begin again, to learn a new way of knowing and living out his faith. In Genesis, God commands Abram and Sarai to leave everything — their home, their family, their land — to seek the land of Canaan and begin again. At 75 years old, Abram is called to start over, but through this new beginning, God creates a new family and a new nation. Like Nicodemus, what are the questions we ask in the dark? Like Abram and Sarai, how do we follow God's calling to begin again? Scriptures: Genesis 12:1-4a, John 3:1-17

March 12- 3rd Sunday in Lent

Jesus crosses cultural, religious, and societal boundaries by leading his disciples through Samaria. In the heat of midday, he seeks out connection with a Samaritan woman drawing water from the well. His command to her is also a question and an invitation to a new way of life: Will you give me a drink? For the woman, to respond is risky but life-changing. This question creates a dialogue between them in which Jesus sees the woman fully; she leaves the well transformed. In the wilderness, the Israelites essentially ask: Will you give us a drink, God? Will you take care of us, even now? In their discomfort and fatigue, they question Moses and God. This week, we might imagine ourselves at the well or in the wilderness. Are we willing to care for our neighbors, seeking to not just quench thirst, but to find living waters that sustain us all? In this season, what are you thirsting for? In what ways are you needing sustenance?

Scriptures: Exodus 17:1-7, John 4:5-42

March 19 - 4th Sunday in Lent

When it comes to faith, sometimes there are bad auestions — auestions that are formed by assumptions, questions that lead us to judgment or isolation. When Jesus and the disciples encounter a blind man along the way, the disciples immediately ask, "Teacher, who sinned, this man or his parents, that he was born blind?" (John 9:2). They ask a bad question. Their question assumes that illness and disability are the result of sin; it assumes that the man deserved to be born blind; it assumes that physical blindness is a form of failure. Unfortunately. the crowd continues to interrogate the man and dissect the miracle of what happens to him. The crowd also asks bad questions because their intent is to drive him out and prove that Jesus is a heretic. This week, let us pay attention to the questions we ask. What assumptions do we carry? What is our intent? When seeking clarity or understanding, what are better questions we can ask?

Scriptures: John 9:1-41

March 26 - 5th Sunday in Lent

When you find yourself in a valley of dry bones, when all hope seems lost, when death and grief surround you, with desperation you might cry out, "Can these bones live?" In Ezekiel's vision, God asks this question of us. Do we believe new life can come after death? Can we find hope when things are bleak? Can we really trust in God's resurrection? While we look to God to carry us through the valley, God looks to us to embody hope for others. As we prepare to enter Holy Week, we remember how Jesus began his final journey toward resurrection: by returning to Judea after the death of his dear friend, Lazarus. As we walk through the valley of dry bones that leads us to Calvary Hill, let us seek out the hope that will stir in us and sustain us.

Scriptures: Ezekiel 37:1-14, John 11:1-45



Council Meeting Minutes February 7, 2023-Approved Respectfully submitted by Cindy Thompson, BLC Council secretary

CALL TO ORDER: Mark Holste called the meeting to order at 7:00p.m.

Attending: Pr. Katie Chullino, Mark Holste, Cindy Thompson, Greg Schumann, Mike Smith, Cathy Goodman, Glenn Summers, Sabrina Lee, and Cindy Tayler Absent: Steve Dawson, Jaime Updegraff



DEVOTIONS AND PRAYER: Pr. Katie shared devotions from All Creation Sings (ACS) pew edition. ACS is a collection of songs and prayers for community worship and is a supplement to our hymnal. Council joined in prayer response with Pr. Katie and felt this supplement really helped Council focus on ministry and the tasks of BLC as President Mark opened the business meeting.

MINUTES OF PREVIOUS MEETING: approved via email and posted

Email Motion: On January 25th, Cindy Tayler moved that the council approve the After School Food & Fun Club to begin Saturday, February 11th for registration and Wednesday, February 15th for the first event with ongoing Wednesdays throughout the school year. Seconded by Greg Schumann. Motion passed on 1/28/23.

FINANCIAL REPORT: Greg shared January's income was approx. \$41,000, expenses approx. \$33,000 with a net of \$8,000. The increase in the January income was partly due to pledges paid for the whole year. Greg shared that several people have come to him with positive remarks regarding the start of 2023. Additional information can be found in Greg's February Council report. Cindy Tayler moved to approve the financial report. Sabrina seconded. Motion passed.

REPORT HIGHLIGHTS:

Mission Ministry: Cathy shared that Bob Cotton has volunteered so many hours for the in-country mission trip/Hopi mission trip. Information regarding this trip is in her February report and a motion to approve a fundraiser for this trip is in the New Business section below.

Property Ministry: Glenn is moving forward with repairs. Property has launched the fundraiser for "raising of the wings" repairs. Information was posted in the February newsletter and Sunday % bulletin. Bob Lee will supervise Bethlehem's grass cutting (thanks Bob). Property will recruit LOC to participate in Spring/Fall cleanups.

Worship: Sabrina shared January was a very successful month as attendance numbers increased and members noticed several visitors returning to worship again at BLC. Members are encouraged to greet these visitors and let the Greeters know if they observe a visitor. She said several volunteers helped take down the Chrismon tree and all the branches are organized for an easy set-up come December. Bethlehem use to have 4-5 volunteers who organized and cleaned the worship center weekly and we may want to return to this process. Pr. Katie brought up the idea of setting up one computer with SignUpGenius in the narthex to get volunteers up to date.

Evangelism:

 Cindy Tayler shared the ASF&F (After School Food & Fun) club will begin signups this Saturday 2/11 and begin next
 Wednesday 2/15. Cindy said the group that has worked hard to create/organize and set this up is amazing and such a blessing.
 Cindy is asking the Council to volunteer on Wednesdays, especially this first
 Wednesday. One adult per 10 children must be in attendance.

Evangelism

- Cindy said she has seen new members each Sunday. Council will need to schedule a new membership Sunday. Name tags have been reorganized and new name tags will be prepared for our newest members. Members are asked to begin wearing their name tags again. Council members need to wear their name tags.
- Evangelism will begin working on updating the picture wall.

NEW BUSINESS:

Land Stewardship Team: Chili Chullino, representing the Land Stewardship Team, shared "Growing Gardens" has been a community garden operating at the Longmont YMCA but the Y no longer has space for the garden due to their new turf project. The long term need is great. The team is interested in using the field north of the church for "Growing Gardens" to relocate. The Land Stewardship team would help with a land use agreement (legal document), as well as city planning requirements. This will require a congregational vote. Growing Gardens/BLC suggested a 2023-24 pilot year. Tim Villard, Food Project Manager at Growing Gardens said the budget would be \$3500. BLC would cover water usage cost only.

Cindy Tayler moved that Growing Gardens be allowed to use the existing garden space at Bethlehem this fall 2023-24 as a pilot year. Sabrina seconded.

Discussion:

- 1. Would Growing Gardens need to enter the building for restroom services? Yes
- 2. What about security regarding that space? Such as fencing? No security required
- 3. Do we need signage? Signage might help the space be respected and let the community know about this ministry. The Fields on 15th distributed flyers regarding this project. The group received 15 emails all positives regarding this idea and offers of help
- 4. The Longmont Times Call should be notified of this pilot

The Land Stewardship Team has members from LOC on this committee. Growing Gardens has over 560 children visit, over 1200# of fresh produce has been donated/shared. They participate in Cultiva Youth Project: a youth leadership program where youth participate in the operations of the farm.

Motion passed.

Council Notes (con't)

NEW BUSINESS:

- Bank signatures: Greg moved Council pass a resolution adding Greg Schumann, Karen Haag and Mark Holste as designees/signers on the BLC bank account, Independent Financial, and removing Gene Schnabel and Matt James as signers. Mike seconded. Motion passed.
- **Agape Fund**: Pr. Katie shared King Sooper gift cards are in the front office to help those in need. Contact Pr. Katie if you would like to be trained on how to give out these gift cards.
- BSA Troop 548: Pr. Katie received a request from Paul Wiggins, leader of Troop 548. Troop 548 has been chartered by the Moose Lodge but the Moose Lodge has been asked to discontinue their sponsorship with the Boy Scouts. Troop 548 is asking Bethlehem Lutheran to consider chartering them. They currently have 19 scouts, a dozen active parents and maintain their own budget/funding. The Moose Lodge is willing to allow them to continue to meet at their facility. Pr. Katie talked to Paul about bank accounts and responsibilities of the head of charter which would probably be Pr. Katie and possibly another person. Pr. Katie asked him about if girls could be members. Paul shared they are open to girls joining but haven't had a significant interest. The Scouts require at least 5 interested girls and 2 female adult leaders. Cindy Tayler moved that we accept Boy Scout Troop 548 by chartering them. Sabrina seconded. Motion passed with 9 yeas and 1 nay. Glenn would like to see more discussion and Council agreed to wait for more information and a presentation to Council by a leader from Troop 548. Mark tabled the motion to next month's meeting.
- Mission Trip Fund Raiser: Cathy shared that Bob Cotton has quality books that he would like to offer up for a cost/donations at a fundraising book sale. LOC would do a book sale on Feb 18th and BLC would do a book sale on Feb 19th with all proceeds going to the Hopi mission trip. Bob also is inviting BLCers to donate books as well. The room across from the fireside room will be used for storage. Cathy moved that we grant permission to the Mission Team to conduct a book sale fundraiser. Glenn seconded the motion. Motion carried.
- **Volunteer Hours**: Do we need to continue keeping track of volunteer hours? After discussion, recording of volunteer hours will be placed on hiatus until further notice.
- Thanks to Andrea Kragerud: Special thanks to Andrea Kragerud for helping with worship the month of January in Pr. Katie's absence. Andrea and her family have been such a blessing to Bethlehem.
- What ministry does "Growing Gardens" come under? For now it will be designated as a special project.
- This summer we need to look at ministries and see what needs to be renamed/rearranged. We
 have to be mindful of changes to constitution and bylaws and the longevity of this process.

Faith Formation - Lenten Mentoring

Top Ten Ideas for Mentors

- 1. Pray frequently for your mentee and the mentoring relationship. Tell your mentee you are praying for them. Ask if they have anything specific they would like you to include in your prayers.
- 2. Meet your mentee's parent(s.)
- 3. Don't think you need to be an 'expert' or know everything.
- 4. Be authentic, transparent and vulnerable.
- 5. Read the discussion materials before each session.
- 6. Don't lecture or give a sermon it's a discussion! Listen!
- 7. Don't be afraid to say you don't know.
- 8. Value and affirm your mentee's thoughts, ideas and discussion.
- 9. Agree to maintain confidentiality between you and your mentee.
- 10. Have fun!

Top Ten Ideas for Mentees

- 1. Pray frequently for your mentor and the mentoring relationship. Tell your mentor you are praying for them. Ask if they have anything specific they would like you to include in your prayers.
- 2. Be yourself.
- 3. Get to know your mentor by asking lots of questions.
- 4. Be honest and open.
- 5. Answer questions with more than one or two word sentences it's a discussion! Listen!
- 6. Be willing to learn new things.
- 7. Value and affirm your mentor's thoughts, ideas and discussion.
- 8. Thank your mentor for their willingness to spend time with you.
- 9. Agree to maintain confidentiality between you and your mentor.
- 10. Have fun!

The Seven Dos of Mentoring

Be Consistent

I will be dependable and trustworthy as a mentor. To the best of my ability, I will honor my commitments and keep my promises. I will be there for the youth I am mentoring on a regular and consistent basis for as long as I am required to do so.

Be Yourself

I will be thankful for who I am—for the personality, gifts, talents, abilities, and attributes that God has specifically given to me. I believe that God knows me, loves me, and has called me to serve as a mentor to youth. And I am confident that God will be able to use me just the way I am.

Be a Listener

I will take every opportunity to be a good listener in my mentoring relationship. I will avoid judging and lecturing. I will listen attentively because I care, and because I desire to treat the youth I am mentoring with dignity and respect.

Be Honest

I will do my best to tell the truth always in my mentoring relationship, even when it hurts. In so doing, I will inspire the youth I am mentoring to be honest with me. When either of us is unsure of the truth, we will be honest with each other and seek to discover the truth together.

Be Patient and Forgiving

I will be realistic about the expectations I have for the youth I am mentoring. I will do my best to demonstrate unconditional love in every circumstance by being gracious, understanding, slow to anger, patient and forgiving. I will not allow failures to destroy our relationship.

Be Encouraging

I will bring out the best in the youth I am mentoring by being generous with affirmation, encouragement, gratitude, and praise. I will do all that I can to inspire my youth to dream dreams and to recognize the potential that he or she has in Christ Jesus.

Pray Hard

I will not become frustrated or discouraged because of my inability to change a young person's life. Instead, I will pray daily for the youth I am mentoring, and trust God to do what I cannot do.



Why am I interested in Immigration?

Growing up in Florida in the 1960's, I remember hiding under our desks in case of a nuclear attack from 90 miles away and many Cubans immigrating there. They came to escape Communist oppression, arrest and the seizure of their property and assets. The positive contributions made to our society were numerous, welcomed and appreciated. These refugees became our neighbors and friends.

In the 1980's our church, Grace Lutheran, sponsored several Vietnamese families. We came to know and admire their desire for freedom, perseverance, determination and work ethic. Our pastor, August Bernthal, who worked intently with LIRS, instilled in us the scriptural basis for helping the immigrant and stranger amongst us.

As a result of 9/11, our attitude toward immigrants seemed to change in the 2000's. It didn't matter if the immigrants came from Venezuela, Miramar, Bosnia or Rwanda-- they were all lumped into being an Al Queda terrorist or drug smuggler. The vast number, (probably 99%) were like the 1960 Cubans, humans wanting a chance for freedom and an opportunity to work to provide for their families and escape the violence in their native land.

I worked in agriculture for 40 years and can say without any reservation that American agriculture would not exist as it is today without immigration. In an attempt to regulate immigration the H2A program was established. Although it was greatly beneficial, it provided only a small part of the agricultural labor needed.

The scriptural basis for welcoming are numerous; a few include Lev. 19:33-34,23:22, Deut.10:19,24:21,27:19, Job 31:32, Matt. 12:35-43, and Heb.13:2-3.

In Summary, welcoming the immigrant and stranger is the right thing to do to help others. It is important to our economic future as our aging population and declining birth rates require a younger workforce, and it is what God through the scriptures calls us to do.

Recipe

Let's celebrate Saint Patty's Day with some Irish recipes. Recipes courtesy of The Food Network.

Irish Coddle

<u>Ingredients</u>

- 1 pound thick-cut bacon, cut into 1-inch pieces
- 1 pound Cumberland sausage or any mild pork sausage, cut into 1-inch pieces
- 2 large white onions, halved and thinly sliced
- Salt and ground black pepper
- 1 cup fresh parsley leaves, finely chopped
- 3 pounds russet potatoes, peeled and quartered

Directions

- Preheat the oven to 300 degrees F.
- Add the bacon to a large Dutch oven and set over medium heat. Cook, stirring occasionally, until the fat renders, about 10 minutes. Add the sausage and increase the heat to medium high. Continue to cook, stirring occasionally, until the bacon and sausage are nicely browned, about 10 more minutes. Remove the pot from the heat and use a slotted spoon to transfer the bacon and sausage to a plate.
- Drain the fat from the pot and return it to medium heat. Add the onions, a pinch of salt and 1/4 cup water. Use a wooden spoon to scrape the brown bits from the bottom and sides of the pot, then sprinkle 1 tablespoon of the parsley and plenty of black pepper. Layer the bacon and sausage over the onions and sprinkle with 1 tablespoon parsley and more black pepper. Layer the potatoes over the meat and add enough water to submerge everything but the potatoes, about 2 cups. Season the potato layer with a pinch of salt and plenty of black pepper and sprinkle with 1 tablespoon parsley. Bring the liquid to a boil (don't stir!), then cover and transfer to the oven. Bake, checking halfway to add more water if needed, until the onions are very tender and caramelized and the liquid has reduced slightly, about 2 hours.

Fried Cabbage

Ingredients

- 2 tablespoons unsalted butter
- 4 slices bacon sliced crosswise into 1/2-inch strips
- 1 medium onion, diced
- 3 cloves garlic, sliced
- 1/2 large head green cabbage, quartered, cored and sliced crosswise into 1/2-inch-thick slices
- Salt and ground black pepper
- 2 teaspoons Worcestershire sauce

Directions

- Place the butter and the bacon in a large
 Dutch oven or pot with a lid over medium-high
 heat. Cook, stirring occasionally, until bacon is
 lightly browned and crisp, 7 to 8 minutes
 (lower the heat if the bacon begins to get too
 dark). Remove the bacon and reserve (do not
 wipe out pot).
- Add onion, garlic, and 1/2 teaspoon salt to the pot, stirring frequently and scraping up any browned bits from the bottom of the pan.
 Cook until the onion is very soft, about 8 minutes.
- With the heat at medium-high, add the cabbage, 1 teaspoon salt, and 1/4 teaspoon black pepper. Stir until the cabbage starts to soften, 5 minutes. Reduce heat to medium-low or low and cook, covered, until the cabbage is very tender, with a little bit of texture remaining in the thicker rib pieces, 12 to 15 minutes, stirring occasionally to make sure the bottom isn't getting too dark.
- Uncover the pot and increase heat to high.
 Add the Worcestershire sauce and stir for
 about a minute. There should be almost no
 liquid in the pot. Transfer to a serving bowl
 and top with the reserved bacon bits.
