Rev's Revelations



"Welcome one another, therefore, just as Christ has welcomed you, for the glory of God." Romans 15:7

My parents and I recently visited a church together. The building was beautifully crafted—with stone and brick and wooden beams. The sanctuary was lit through stained glass windows—and the altar was marble. It was really breathtaking. There were hallways and rooms in every direction—it would be a perfect building for a youth group playing hide and seek.

What it wasn't built for was welcoming visitors. After walking through the double doors, we expected signs of welcome—actual signs for things like the Restroom or Sanctuary or Office and spiritual signs like people shaking hands, saying, "Welcome to XYZ Lutheran Church," or, "Hi, I don't think I've met you, I'm Marty." But instead, this congregation was the definition of The Frozen Chosen. They somehow managed to make mid-August in the midwest feel cold.

Being a visitor means being vulnerable. Brene Brown explains that vulnerability is "the feeling we get during times of uncertainty, risk, or emotional exposure." When you're visiting someone's home, you are at the mercy of your hosts for food and shelter—you may be uncertain about the strange casserole you're served or the Jello salad. When you're visiting another country (sometimes even another state or city), you risk taking a wrong turn and becoming lost or not knowing the language of community.

Being a visitor in a church requires vulnerability, too. When you step through someone else's double doors and into their holy space, there's a lot you don't know. Where are the restrooms? Will I know the tune to the songs? Is this a "sins" or "trespasses" church? Is there coffee? Can I have communion here? The visitor's vulnerability—the risk, the uncertainty, the emotional exposure—can be summed up in the question: Am I welcome here?

As we kick-off a new program year, we are focusing on our mission to Welcome. Welcome is part of our BLC Mission Statement because of the many ways followers of Jesus are called to welcome all kinds of people. During the month of September, I encourage you to think about where you feel welcome—both inside and outside BLC. What physical signs welcome you? What spiritual signs welcome you? How do we at Bethlehem welcome others? How can we better welcome others? (Notice the second person plural, we, meaning you and me and all of those who consider themselves part of this community!)

Sunday Worship

September 3

When Peter doesn't grasp Jesus' words about suffering, Jesus tells the disciples they will find their lives in losing them. Such sacrificial love is described by Paul when he urges us to associate with the lowly and not repay evil with evil. In worship we gather as a community that we might offer ourselves for the sake of our suffering world. **Readings**: Romans 12:9–21, Matthew 16:21–28

September 10 (God's Work Our Hands) Conflict is a part of relationships and life in community. Jesus' words in today's gospel are often used in situations having to do with church discipline. The prophet Ezekiel tells of warning the wicked to turn from their ways, and Paul reminds us that love is the fulfilling of the law. We gather in the name of Christ, assured that he is present among us with gifts of peace and reconciliation.

Readings: Romans 13:8–14, Matthew 18:15–20

September 17

In today's second reading Paul questions why we judge one another, since we all stand before the judgment of God. Yet we do sin against one another, and Jesus' challenge that we forgive seventy-seven times reveals God's boundless mercy. When we hear the words of forgiveness in worship and sign ourselves with the cross, we are renewed in baptism to be signs of reconciliation in the world.



September 24

Matthew narrates one of Jesus' controversial parables in which Jesus says that the reign of God is like that of a landowner who pays his workers the same wage no matter what time of day they began to work. When God changes God's mind about punishing Nineveh for their evil ways, Jonah is angry. Yet God is gracious and merciful, abounding in steadfast love. In baptism we receive the grace of God that is freely given to all. As Martin Luther wrote, in the presence of God's mercy we are all beggars.

Readings: Jonah 3:10–4:11, Matthew 20:1–6

October 1: New Series! "I've Been Meaning to Ask..."

In order to build connection and trust, we need to listen to each other's stories and experiences to learn who and what has shaped us. We also need to feel seen and known for who we are. In this first week, we hope to affirm the particularity of our identities while also acknowledging our common ground. Formed from the dust and God's very breath in the garden of Eden, we have a common home, a shared birthplace, and a collective calling: to sustain and care for all of creation. The story of Jesus calling the disciples provides a helpful charge for the whole series: to "come and see" what the journey holds. In this first week, we wish to address how the question, "Where are you from?" is sometimes coupled with assumptions, judgments, and even microaggressions—all of which can be exhausting and painful to receive. Our hope is to acknowledge, disrupt, and release the assumptions we hold about others. **Readings**: Genesis 2:4b–15, John 1:35–51


From the desk of the Faith Formation Director Gary:

This year's theme at BLC is WELCOMING!!!





CALL TO ORDER: Mark Holste called the meeting to order at 7:03pm.

DEVOTIONS AND PRAYER: Pr. Katie shared "Do You Have a Need to No?" Pr. Katie challenges everyone to say "no" when needed to give themselves time to rest or meter themselves.

MINUTES OF PREVIOUS MEETING:

FINANCIAL REPORT: General Fund giving this month was below budget by \$857 in the month of July. General Fund expenses were over budget by \$2,260. This month's giving was approximately \$1,068 above last July's giving. The insurance check (for the roof) makes it look like we have a large sum of cash in our general fund that is there only momentarily. The new budget process is starting. Budgets are due by all ministries at the November Council meeting. Sabrina moved to accept the financial report. Mike seconded. Discussion: None. Motion passed.

REPORT HIGHLIGHTS:

Pastor/Staff: A Brewsday has been added next Tuesday morning at church. The Best Skills Best Churches class has had 4 sessions. Pr. Katie learned less is more in terms of notes.

- Worship: SignUp Genius and the new system is being used. Worship would like to schedule brief sessions explaining the duties of the various worship/volunteer activities each Fall with the hope more people will be comfortable volunteering with some instruction. Communion is at the altar rail every other Sunday alternating with station communion. Often, communion originally planned at the altar is switched to station communion because of special events during worship or lack of communion assistants. All members are encouraged to signup to assist with communion but assistants are especially needed at the 2nd service.
- Evangelism: EPIC awesome BBQ and concert was a success! AND the 10th anniversary ordination celebration for Pr. Katie was a hit! The photo wall is coming together. Please email a photo to evangelism@bethlehem-lutheran.net. Check out all the new pictures!

Faith Formation:

- Rally Day is scheduled for Sunday, August 27th during the learning hour. We will have fun activities planned for the kids and will work with parents to register their children for Sunday School.
- Family Swim Night is happening Sunday,
 August 27th at 5:00 p.m. at The Shores pool in the Updegraff's neighborhood.
- Youth Lock-in scheduled for September 8th.
- The first family outing of the fall will be at Miller Farms on September 16th at 9 a.m.
 Families will meet at church and head over together.
- Youth Sunday is scheduled for October 29th where our confirmands will be affirming their baptisms.

Council Notes (con't)

- Mission: Mark highlighted Cathy's report.
 - An informational event, "Immigration, Facts and Myths" with BLC/LOC and CTS presenter and immigration lawyer along with a potluck was held on July 12. There were 31 adults in attendance along with Girl Scouts providing child care and children in the nursery.
 - The burrito fund raiser raised \$937 from BLC and \$909 from LOC for the border immersion trip to cover scholarships, with any money above what is needed for scholarships going towards our fund raising for Cristo Rey in El Paso.
 - The Nicaragua Mission fund raiser was a success and, together with the Thrivent Choice dollars approved by council, raised sufficient funds from donors within and outside of our congregation to support the children's project in Somoto for six months.
- Property: Mark highlighted Glenn's report.
 - Property retained a handyman for projects.
 - Repair on the floor transitions has begun.
 - Drinking water test for lead/contamination was conducted. The water fountain in the Fellowship Hall is out of compliance and has been tagged "Out of Service". It will be tested again per state requirements next week. If still out of compliance remediation will be required and the costs (grant) will be covered by the county.
 - The church/parsonage roofs were damaged by the hail event in early May. We have received an estimate and first payment. Our roofing contractor will manage the project. Work should start next week. It will take approximately three weeks to complete.
 - Replaced a valve on the sprinkler system.
 - Cleaning of the furnace room. (in progress)
- Stewardship: Mike shared Consecration Sunday (name may change) is scheduled for October 22nd.
 Mike asked for impressions of Consecration Sunday 2022.

NEW BUSINESS: Share the Grace/God's Work Our Hands 10 Sep – Request to be able to ask the congregation for donations - Cathy

Mark Holste moved that Missions Ministry may ask congregants through the weekly emails, the bulletin, and an announcement to bring items for the September 10 Share the Grace/God's Work Our Hands (GWOH) event ahead of September 10th to the church. Sabrina seconded. Discussion: Pr. Katie noted that a fundraiser for the Immersion trip will be completed by this date. Motion Passed.

Discussion: Mark asked that Council share thoughts on the following discussion items

- Consecration Sunday 10/22: Council members suggested that we provide the meal rather than have it catered. A potluck is another possibility. What if we pledge on Consecration Sunday but celebrate and share a meal a different Sunday? Council suggested to Stewardship that Consecration Sunday for pledges be 10/22. Pledges will be counted and a celebration of giving would occur on All Saint's Sunday, 11/5 from 11:30–1:00. Members of Council are going to ask various members to help with the meal. Further discussion will be held at September Council meeting.
- Repaint parking lot stripes Boy Scout Troop is being asked to restripe.
- Ring Camera Doorbell for Cornerstone Preschool - funds will come from property budget.

Start where you are. Use what you have. Do what you can. —Arthur Ashe

I come from a family that was always volunteering for good in the community. In the 50's and 60's I was involved in "Service Projects" with Girl Scouts and church groups. Whether it was picking up roadside trash or singing Christmas carols at the local state hospital, there was always some way to give of your time and talents.

I still use my time and talents on as many levels as I can handle. As a retired person now, living outside of Lyons, I have the luxury of choosing what I get involved in.

There are needs everywhere you look.

At the family level, it has involved helping someone with oral surgery to fix a dental problem they couldn't afford, or to buy a much needed used car for another. Babysitting or caring for someone in an emergency is something I can do with my time that others can't.

At the neighborhood level, I am a Lyons Prepared local volunteer. That means in an emergency situation, I check on my neighbors and maintain communication with the Lyons Fire Department. This need came out after the 2013 Lyons Flood.

At the community level, LEAF in Lyons (Lyons Emergency Assistance Fund) is near and dear to my heart. I volunteer as a Food Pantry volunteer, helping to collect food donations and do home delivery to locals who can't get to the Wednesday Lyons Food Pantry. LEAF also coordinates Meals on Wheels, Lyons Volunteers, and helps with local utilities and rent needs for local residents. I also serve on their board.

Reading has also been a passion of mine, so restocking our local Lyons Little Libraries, especially our Rocky Mountain Botanic Garden one, is something I do weekly. Friends give me books they are finished with and I take them for credit in Longmont and purchase books to restock the Libraries.

At Bethlehem, I volunteer to bind the quilts that are tied on Thursdays. When I can, I work as a "gopher" on our Habitat for Humanity build days. Choir is something I want to participate with more (though Covid, has changed how I view my exposure). I'll be going on the Bethlehem Border Immersion Trip in October to El Paso, and will help drive Josephine. I've been involved with a local Ukrainian family adjusting to life in the US in the last year, and am very concerned about the inequities in our US Immigration Policies. (continued on next page)

At a national level, I continue to be a blood donor. My daughter needed 14 units of blood when she gave birth to her first child, so you never know when someone you love or know may need blood. After donating 141 units of whole blood, it's just something I do every 2 months.

Internationally, I have volunteered with Global Volunteers in St. Lucia (and I am going to Cuba next February) to teach English to high school students, community gardening and doing building repairs.

While attending Christ Our Savior Lutheran in Longmont, my husband Mike and I traveled to Guatemala for 4 years with a group working to build a community center for a small Mayan village and support their school. I look forward to being a part of BLC's Nicaragua project.

Christ said to love your neighbor as yourself. There is no better way to show that than to volunteer to help your neighbor. Look around you, you can start where you are, use what you have, and do what you can.

Summer Volunteer Work in Sitka Alaska by Ken & Phyllis Wright

"Welcome to Sitka Lutheran Church, the first protestant church on the west coast of America" is the way Ken and I began each day in Sitka, Alaska. We were asked to spend the month of June in Sitka sharing the history of Sitka Lutheran Church as volunteers. It's a beautiful place to be! Sitka is located on Baranof Island and is on the outer coast of Alaska's inside passage. As a cruise ship port many people are familiar with Sitka. In 1867 the US purchased Alaska from Russia and Sitka became Alaska's first capital city.

So here's a bit of history of Sitka Lutheran Church (SLC). SLC was founded in 1840 by Finnish immigrants. The immigrants received permission from Russia to build the church and Russia presented SLC a deed for the property in perpetuity. Today SLC acknowledges the Russian Empire had no right to convey the land to the church and they acknowledge with gratitude that SLC sits on the unceded land of the Tlingit people who have been there since time "immemorial".

The story of SLC proceeds from 1840 to the present day, from deterioration and destruction to the rebuilding of an active, vibrant and progressive church community. The church holds artifacts from the 1840 era including a Kessler pipe organ which was built specifically for SLC in Estonia and arrived in 1844. It also has an original picture of the Transfiguration of Jesus painted by a Finnish artist which arrived at SLC in 1840 with the immigrants. Both the organ and the painting have been fully restored and reside in the church along with other artifacts.

Each day while Ken sold bottled water, homemade Salmonberry jelly and popcorn, which fund the outreach ministries of SLC, I gave innumerable tours of the church, told of its history and directed people to the bathrooms. One ministry of the church is to open its bathrooms to the public and I can't tell you how grateful people are for this ministry! One gentleman from Thailand was so impressed he stated was going to introduce this "toilet ministry" to his home congregation in Thailand! We all had a good laugh over that! People commented over and over again about the peaceful and simplistic sanctuary provided for them in the midst of their hectic day.



The population of Sitka is approximately 9000, and most days there were between 4000 and 6500 passengers on the cruise ships; however, there were a few days when the number of cruisers outnumbered the population of Sitka. We met people from all over the world, from 17 different countries and from 39 of the states of the US. I even met a classmate from my graduating class of Longmont High School! Now that was amazing!

We must say that this was not a "vacation". We were tired at the end of each day but happily cleaned the bathrooms, and the popcorn machine to get ready for the next day. Fun is not the word we would use to describe our experience, but it was definitely educational and rewarding.

When we returned home the first sermon at BLC was taken from Matthew 10 and Pastor Katie focused not only on welcoming others but also on how others welcome you. As Jesus said "whoever welcomes YOU welcomes me". The SLC community welcomed us into their hearts, homes, church, and community, and as we reflected on the provisions given to us - shelter, food, and friendship, we were so very grateful! In turn, we were able to welcome hundreds of people into SLC to tell the amazing history of SLC and how, even though it was destroyed, not once, not twice, but three times, it came back literally from the ashes, and is a thriving, welcoming and giving community today.
