Rev's Revelations



Happy All Saints' Day!

November 1 is the traditional celebration of the saints. Aligning with other holidays, this one is meant as a day of remembrance and thanksgiving. But this holiday also begs the questions, "Who are the saints? Are they only the best of Christians? Are they all dead? Are they all Catholic? Are we supposed to pray to them or for them?"

During my internship, I asked during a children's sermon, "What is a saint?" A seven-year-old boy answered, "Someone who is, um, by God?" That's about the best answer I've heard.

A saint is a person who is hallowed (a less frequently used word for holy). You probably recognize different saints like Catherine of Siena, Anthony of Padua, Teresa of Avila. Those are people who were made saints through a process in the Roman Catholic Church (RCC). Throughout time, Christians of various denominations have prayed to saints, traveled to see and touch relics, and revered those canonized as saints as the holiest of Christians. For modern day Lutherans, sainthood is something different. A saint is still a person who is holy but that person does not go through a process in the church to be considered a holy. Martin Luther wrote in the Large Catechism:

At whatever time God's Word is taught, preached, heard, read, or pondered, there the person, the day, and the work is hallowed, not on account of the external work but on account of the Word that makes us all saints.

A saint is made holy by God's Word at work in their life. And, that makes us all saints. We are all by God. Whether we feel holy or not, whether we do the deeds of Mother Theresa, whether we perform miracles of healing, and whether we really want to be or not, God works through the gospel to call us saints.

As we wind down from the Reformation take time to ponder:

How has God made you holy? For what has God made you holy?

November 5 – All Saints' Sunday, Jazz Service

All Saints celebrates the people of God, living and dead, who are the body of Christ. As November heralds the dying of the landscape in many northern regions, the readings and liturgy call us to remember all who have died in Christ and whose baptism is complete. At the Lord's table we gather with the faithful of every time and place, trusting that the promises of God will be fulfilled and that all tears will be wiped away in the new Jerusalem.

Readings: Revelation 7:9–17; 1 John 3:1–3:

November 12

Today the prophet Amos calls for justice to roll down like waters. Paul urges us to encourage one another with the promised coming of the Lord. Jesus tells the parable of the wise and foolish bridesmaids. Surrounded by the faithful of every time and place, we celebrate Christ's coming in our midst in the word of life and the feast of victory—the marriage feast of the lamb.

Readings: Amos 5:18–24; Matthew 25:1–13

November 19

Paul says it will come like a thief in the night and urges us to be awake and sober. Jesus tells the parable of the talents, calling us to use our gifts, while we still have time, for the greater and common good. In a world filled with violence and despair, we gather around signs of hope—word, water, bread, and wine—eager to welcome the good news of Christ's coming among us. **Readings**: 1 Thessalonians 5:1–11, Matthew 25:14–30



November 26 – Advent 1: Hope

We acknowledge our weariness

As Advent begins, we start by acknowledging the weariness, grief, rage, and hopelessness we carry and we also affirm that we are made for joy. Joy is designed to live in a full house of other emotions. We start the season with Zechariah and Elizabeth: they have battled infertility and have lived many years steadfast in their faith. Perhaps they feel the weight of hopes and dreams unattained. The angel comes to Zechariah with a promise of good news, but Zechariah can't fully receive it, and he is cast into silence for the duration of Elizabeth's pregnancy. Sometimes weariness can harden us and prevent us from living fully. We've had hard journeys. Grief has left a scar on us. This is how we show up to Advent. Let us acknowledge the ways we, too, are hardened by disbelief. Like the psalmist, let us ask, "how long?" and plead for restoration. In this weary world, may we find many ways to rejoice. **Readings**: Psalm 80:1–7, 17–19; Luke 1:1-23

December 3 – Advent 2: Peace

We find joy in connection

In community, our joy expands. When we can't rejoice, we can carry each other's joy. That is what Elizabeth and Mary do for each other. The good news begins to take shape in Elizabeth's womb, but scripture tells us that she stays secluded, hiding her pregnancy from others—that is, until Mary arrives at her door, also pregnant. Perhaps Mary's arrival is the inbreaking that changes everything for Elizabeth, for in that moment, her child leaps in her womb and she is filled with the Spirit. She can't help but to rejoice. Her joy is contagious and wraps around Mary like a hug. Through the prophet Isaiah, we hear God speak tender words of comfort; this is the comfort we can give to and receive from each other during this season. In this weary world, may we find many ways to rejoice. Readings: Isaiah 40:1-11; Luke 1:24-45

Fall Recipe

Pumpkin Chili

Ingredients

- 1 tbsp. olive oil
- 1 lb. ground spicy Italian sausage
- 1 onion, chopped
- 1 red bell pepper, chopped
- 3 garlic cloves, chopped
- 2 tsp. ground cumin
- 1 1/2 tbsp. chili powder
- 1 tsp. kosher salt, plus more to taste
- 3/4 tsp. ground black pepper
- 1/2 tsp. ground cinnamon
- 2 (15-oz.) cans tomatoes, not drained
- 1 (15-oz.) can kidney beans, drained
- 1 (15-oz.) can black beans, drained
- 1 (15-oz.) can pumpkin puree
- 2 1/2 c. chicken broth

Directions

- 1. In a large Dutch oven, heat the oil over medium heat. Add the sausage and cook, stirring to break into pieces, until browned and cooked through, 8 to 10 minutes. Using a slotted spoon, transfer the sausage to a paper towel-lined plate to drain.
- 2. Add the onion and bell pepper to the Dutch oven. Cook over medium heat, stirring, until softened, 10 to 12 minutes. Stir in the garlic, cumin, chili powder, salt, black pepper, and cinnamon. Cook, stirring, for 30 seconds.
- 3. Stir in the tomatoes, kidney beans, black beans, pumpkin puree, chicken broth, and sausage. Bring to a boil over medium-high heat. Reduce the heat to medium-low, cover, and cook, stirring occasionally, until the flavors meld, about 20 minutes.
- 4. Season with salt and pepper. Serve with pumpkin seeds, sour cream, and cheese

The Outreach United Resource Center (OUR Center) provides critical services such as food, housing, and utilities to help families achieve self-reliance. They offer a hand up, not a hand out to residents of the St. Vrain Valley School District. While originally focusing on short-term assistance, recently the OUR Center's work has expanded into providing long-term assistance and resources to families in need.

When helping with the OUR Center lunches, I have seen people of all ages. Looking out into the dining room, you can be looking at the people in a dining room at most restaurants. This helps remind me not to judge others at a glance because I don't know their situation. Everyone served is always so thankful to receive a good meal.

Lately, there have been families that have said they don't know what they would do if these meals were not provided. The lunches provided by the OUR center are the only food they will have for the day. It is a blessing to be able to make a small but significant impact in their lives

In addition to the OUR Center lunches,
Bethlehem has also collected items for the
OUR Center Food Pantry. We have collected
food, toiletries, dish soap, laundry soap, and
toddler diapers. Lately, we have collected
items in December; so watch the Star and

items for the food pantry has opened up
conversations about the OUR center and their
mission as people often ask why we are
buying so many groceries at the store.
