#### Rev's Revelations

One of the things I deeply value about our faith, is the timeless tradition of storytelling we get to experience weekly, in worship, in studies, and even in devotion. The more you experience them, the more you notice that the stories themselves are timeless. Have you ever read the book of Revelation and thought: *Gee, these signs are happening now!* Or, have you read the story of the prodigal son and father realizing: they're just like your brother and father. Or, have you heard the story of Job and felt: *Bad things happen to me all the time, and I'm a good person, too!* 

These stories and verses sometimes seem to reach across time and cultures and be about *us* as much as their original characters. The people of the bible have troubles and doubts and failures. We recently read a story where Jesus disciples tried to stop a man from doing *good* in the name of Jesus. They tell Jesus, "We tried to stop him because he was not following us."

That doesn't fly with Jesus. He calls them on what they were doing: creating stumbling blocks. They assumed someone outside of their group could not bear the name of Christ in the world. They refused to listen to what this man was doing and they failed to see he was doing good. They only cared that he wasn't part of their own group.

Their story is timeless.

Nine years ago, Pope Francis visited the United States. He spoke to Congress and the American people saying,

"Our world is increasingly a place of violent conflict, hatred and brutal atrocities, committed even in the name of God and of religion. We know that no religion is immune from forms of individual delusion or ideological extremism. ...

A delicate balance is required to combat violence perpetrated in the name of a religion, an ideology or an economic system, while also safeguarding religious freedom, intellectual freedom and individual freedoms. But there is another temptation which we must especially guard against: the simplistic reductionism which sees only good or evil; or, if you will, the righteous and sinners. The contemporary world, with its open wounds which affect so many of our brothers and sisters, demands that we confront every form of polarization which would divide it into these two camps."

The contemporary world demands that we confront every form of polarization. That story is timeless, too.

I'll let you compare our current wounds. Our current stumbling blocks. The things that polarize you and me and our neighbors and our families. Our indignantly righteous beliefs which insist, "I am right!" and therefor, "You are wrong." "I am good," and so, "You are evil." If you were a disciple, who would you try to stop?

It is said that history repeats itself. And there's truth to that. There is always a group of people in power. There are always people who are unheard, unseen, distrusted, and disbelieved for no reason other than they aren't part of the right crowd. There are always people who want power, who want to be the ruling class or the special, chosen ones. There are always people who have been given the bread of life and who still want more. But this story isn't about what we want.

The story is about the gospel. The good news of Jesus Christ.

This story, the one so timeless, is about peace. And not a kind of peace that comes after some

great realization or at the end of your life or at the end of time. Jesus says, "...be at peace with one another." The Greek word for *peace* in this scripture isn't just a noun, it's a present and active verb—which means that this kind of peace is not a passive thing that happens to people. Being at peace is creating harmony in relationships. To be at peace with one another means to *work*, to *do*.

Sometimes—like during the final weeks of an election season—that work is harder than others. It's easy to assume others aren't doing God's work because we don't know them or we don't think they're "one of us." Our challenge, friends in faith, is to do the hard work, to be peaceful.

#### Prayer of St. Francis

Lord make us instruments of your peace.

Where there is hatred, let us sow love; where there is injury, pardon; where there discord, union; where there is doubt, faith; where there is despair, hope; where there is darkness, light; where there is sadness, joy.

Grant that we may not so much seek to be consoled as to console; to be understood as to understand; to be loved as to love.

For it is in giving that we receive; it is in pardoning that we are pardoned; and it is in dying that we are born to eternal life. Amen.

#### October 4 - Pet Blessing

October 4 is the celebration of St. Francis of Assisi who proclaimed a gospel of care for all of creation-- our beloved furry friends included. Stop by and share a special blessing with your pet from 6:00 - 7:00 p.m. Please keep all pets on leash or in carriers.

#### October 6 - 20th Sunday after Pentecost

(We will not have Communion -- we will be celebrating Thanksgiving for Baptism)
We are called to invite, welcome, and serve God's people--including children. Jesus rebukes the disciples for fending off the children and poses a challenge to them of not only welcoming children, but being like children. What does it mean to receive the kingdom of God as a child does?

#### October 13 - 21st Sunday after Pentecost

The rich man who comes to ask Jesus what he should do to inherit eternal life is a good man, sincere in his asking. Mark's gospel is alone in saying that Jesus looked on him and loved him. Out of love, not as judgment, Jesus offers him an open door to life: sell all you own and give it to the poor. Our culture bombards us with the message that we will find life by consuming. Our assemblies counter this message with the invitation to find life by divesting for the sake of the other.

#### October 20 - 22nd Sunday after Pentecost

Today's gospel starts with disciples obsessing over who will be closest to Jesus, leading to Jesus teaching his followers about God's take on importance and power. Here Jesus makes it explicit that the reversal of values in God's community is a direct challenge to the values of the dominant culture, where wielding power over others is what makes you great. When we pray "your kingdom come" we are praying for an end to tyranny and oppression. We pray this gathered around the cross, a sign of great shame transformed to be the sign of great honor and service.

## October 27 - Reformation Sunday (one service at 9:15 a.m.) Confirmation Led Service

Rooted in the past and growing into the future, the church must always be reformed in order to live out the love of Christ in an ever-changing world. We celebrate the good news of God's grace, that Jesus Christ sets us free every day to do this life-transforming work. Trusting in the freedom given to us in baptism, we pray for the church, that Christians will unite more fully in worship and mission.

#### November 3 - All Saints Sunday - Jazz Sunday!

Jesus states the core of God's law: love God with all you are and have, and love your neighbor as yourself. The scribe agrees that Jesus has rightly identified the most important commandments, much more important than sacrifices. It's easy for us to say with the writer of the letter to the Hebrews that sacrifices aren't needed anymore, but harder to acknowledge that all our worship, all our community service, all our social action, all our family caregiving is worthless if it is done without love.

#### **News from the Worship Ministry**

It seems to me that the Worship Ministry just plugs along without much to say. Not this month! I have a lot to share with you.

We started the summer going to one service at 9:15. This was very well received by the congregation, it was nice to see the sanctuary full, and see friends from the other services. Attendance did drop a little as so many people were on summer vacation. Then Pastor Katie took a well deserved mini Sabbatical. We had Pastor Nicole fill in for the month of August and personally I thought she did an amazing job. I am so glad she got a call to serve at Epiphany Lutheran in Denver.

The council decided to go back to the normal two services starting September 15th. The decision was made because our Sunday School program is just growing after the big drop from COVID. We did not want to do anything that would interrupt this. We look forward to seeing the kids back in Sunday School.

We have been approached to start up a nursery again, something we have not done since COVID. This time it will be different because we want to use this for the little ones, from newborn to 2 years and 364 days. We have a volunteer that will work every week, and then we will ask for a second volunteer (we need to have at least 2 people) that will assist on a rotating basis. The plan is to have this during the second service. It is our hope that having a nursery for the little ones will allow more younger families to come and enjoy our services.

The last topic that we have been discussing is a Music Director. Since Brenda left due to health issues, we have been working with volunteers. Our choir, like many church choirs, is smaller after the pandemic. Betty Rasmussen has been our primary volunteer director and doing a great job finding music for our choir whether there are 5 or 15 vocalists. We thank her for sharing her time and gifts. We continue to evaluate what a new Music Director position may entail. In addition to choir, we hope a Music Director would help incorporate members who play instruments in services as well as other small groups. The possibilities are endless. The biggest concerns are if we have a sufficient number of members to warrant a paid position and how we would pay for that position?

While we consider options, Mary Jane Voogt has volunteered to lead the choir from the end of October through the Christmas season. At that time, choir practice will be between services and not on Wednesday evenings. Please join them if you have any musical ability at all, it would be great to see our choir grow!





Writing in September, it's hard to believe Christmas decorations are in stores and October is here. October is our stewardship month when we request that you indicate your 2025 estimate of giving in order to plan our budget for next year.

Our members and regular attendees are actively involved in many areas of outreach and ministry; you will see people and cars in the parking lot most mornings or evenings at Bethlehem. These may be workers in the Growing Garden, parents of children in Cornerstone Preschool, people attending a bible study, quilters, scouting groups (Boy,Girl,Cub), VBS in the summer, Djembe Drummers, TOPS, the Longmont Concert Band... too many groups and activities to list!

Recovery from the Covid shutdown has been a challenging time for all schools, businesses and organizations including churches. Our recovery has been slow but consistent, particularly with youth. Our high schoolers attended the postponed ELCA National Youth Gathering in New Orleans this summer, our confirmation class is active and we now have enough youth to start a high school youth group with 8-12 participants. This is a ministry to our next generation.

All the ministries mentioned, as well as staff, utilities, insurance, and basic maintenance are supported by your regular giving to the General Fund. In your quarterly statement, you should receive a 2025 Estimate of Giving card as well as a Time and Talent Interest card. In order for us to continue our areas of ministry, both within and outside our walls, please indicate your estimate of giving for 2025 and prayerfully consider an increase over 2024, if you are financially able. By filling out the Time and Talent card, ministry leaders will know your areas of interest and provide you with additional information if you request.

Any time in October, both forms may be deposited in the boxes placed at the entrance to the sanctuary, mailed to the church, or you can complete them online by using the QR codes.
